ANNUAL TOWN MEETING – APRIL 29, 2023 WITH ACTION TAKEN THEREON

With a quorum present at 9:37 a.m. (150 by the Town of Wilmington By-Laws) Jonathan Eaton, Town Moderator called the meeting to order and opened with the Pledge of Allegiance. The colors were presented by the Wilmington Minutemen. He recognized the Wilmington Minutemen, thanking them for their participation. After the Minutemen presented colors, he said the pledge of allegiance.

The Moderator then asked for a moment of silence to recognize Wilmington's emergency personnel, its servicemen and women currently serving our nation in the hope that they would all return home safely, to those who have given their lives in service to our country, and to recognize departed town workers, representatives and members of committees and boards that had passed away during the past year, whose names he read. A moment of silence was observed for all.

Jonathan Eaton recognized three long-time volunteers for their service. Robert DePasquale, Chair of the Housing Authority first elected in 1996 and has served until 2023. Andrea Houser was first appointed to the Carter Lecture fund in 1993 and has decided to step down this year. Pasquale "Pat" D'Antonio, was first appointed to the Cemetery Commission in 2011 and has served until 2023.

The Moderator then began the reading of the warrant.

VOTED: Motion was moved by Select Board Member Lilia Maselli, and seconded by Finance Committee Chair John F. Doherty III, the Town of Wilmington Town Meeting voted that the Moderator dispense the reading of the Warrant and take up and refer to each article by number.

The Moderator declared the motion as voted unanimously.

The Moderator then introduced newly elected and re-elected town officials.

The Moderator declared that all articles were approved by the Finance Committee and Planning Board unless otherwise noted.

Consent Agenda

The Moderator introduced and explained the concept of a Consent Agenda. In the interest of expediency in the conduct of the Town Meeting, which Town Meeting would first entertain a motion to take up specified routine and non-controversial articles as a group, and secondly, the Town Meeting would vote to approve the specified articles. - The Moderator declared the motion as voted unanimously.

ARTICLE 2. (Consent) Hear Reports of Committees and act thereon.

VOTED: By Consent Agenda, the Town of Wilmington Town Meeting voted in the affirmative to approve this article.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, transfer from available funds, or borrow pursuant to any applicable statute a sum of money for the purpose of paying unpaid bills of previous years; or take any other action related thereto.

VOTED: Motion was moved by Select Board Member Kevin Caira and duly seconded by Select Board Member Gregory Bendel it was voted that the article not be adopted.

The Moderator declared the motion as voted unanimously.

ARTICLE 4. (Consent) To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Treasurer/Collector, with the approval of the Select Board, to enter into an agreement, under the provisions of Chapter 44, Section 53F of the Massachusetts General Laws, with one or more banks doing business in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts during Fiscal Year 2024 for a term not to exceed three years, which will permit the Town of Wilmington to maintain funds on deposit with such institutions in return for said institutions providing banking services; or take any other action related thereto.

VOTED: By Consent Agenda, the Town of Wilmington Town Meeting voted in the affirmative to approve this article.

ARTICLE 5. To see how much money the Town will appropriate for the expenses of the Town and the salaries of several Town Officers and Departments and determine how the same shall be raised, whether by taxation, transfer from available funds, or otherwise; or take any other action related thereto.

VOTED: Motion was moved by Finance Committee Chair John F. Doherty III and duly seconded by Finance Committee Vice Chair Theresa Manganelli that the several and respective sums as recommended and presented by the Finance Committee be raised from the FY-24 tax levy and other general revenues of the Town, or by transfer from available funds as may

be recommended by the Finance Committee, and be appropriated for the purpose set forth in Article #5, each budget category including General Government; Public Safety; Public Works; Community Development; Public Buildings; Human Services; Wilmington School Department; Shawsheen Valley Regional Vocational Technical High School District; Maturing Debt and Interest; Unclassified & Reserve and Statutory Charges to be taken up and voted on in the order they appear, subject to amendment, and each budget category not be open for reconsideration until the entire budget is voted.

The Moderator explained that this is a procedural vote to take the budget up by category as it appears in your booklet on pages 2 through 9. The amounts that we will be voting on are the amounts listed in the column "Recommended Appropriation."

The Finance Committee recommends approval for each of these categories.

He also thanked the department heads who will be retiring in the upcoming year. Director of Public Buildings George Hooper, who has been employed by the town since August of 1987, and the Director of the Library, Tina Stewart, who has been employed by the town since July 15, 1974.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, transfer from available funds, or borrow pursuant to any applicable statute a sum of money for the purchase and equipping of new and/or replacement capital equipment, including but not limited to the following items, including any incidental or related expenses, and further to authorize the sale, trade-in, conveyance or other disposition of any equipment being so replaced, such funds to be spent by the Town department, so indicated, with the approval of the Town Manager and, to the extent set forth in Chapter 592 of the Acts of 1950, the Select Board, as follows:

The moderator declared the motion as voted.

ARTICLE 38. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, transfer from available funds or borrow pursuant to any applicable statute a sum of money to pay the Middlesex Retirement System in addition to the annual assessment; or take any other action related thereto.

VOTED: Motion was moved by Select Board Member Gary B. DePalma and seconded by Finance Committee Chair John Doherty III that the sum of <u>One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000)</u> be raised and appropriated from the FY-24 tax levy and other general revenues of the Town for payment to the Middlesex Retirement System in addition to the annual assessment.

The moderator declared the motion as voted.

ARTICLE 39. To see what sum the Town will vote to transfer into various line items of the Fiscal Year 2023 budget from other line items of said budget and from other available funds; or take any other action related thereto.

VOTED: Motion was moved by Select Board Member Frank J. West and seconded by Finance Committee Chair John Doherty III that <u>One Hundred Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$130,000)</u> be transferred from the following fiscal year 2023 accounts:

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Select Board to acquire by gift, purchase, eminent domain, or otherwise all or a portion of the property or any interest therein located at 333 Andover Street and shown on Assessors Map RI as Lot 21A, including any structures and improvements thereon, for municipal purposes including but not limited to the location of a fire/police substation and various active and passive recreational uses, as determined by the Select Board to be in the best interest of the Town; and further, to raise and appropriate, transfer from available funds or borrow pursuant to any applicable statute a sum of money for the acquisition of such property and structures and improvements thereon, including all costs incidental and related thereto; and further to authorize the Select Board to take such actions and execute such documents and agreements as are necessary to effectuate the purposes of this article; or take any other action related thereto.

VOTED: Motion was moved by Select Board Member Gregory Bendel and seconded by Finance Committee Chair John Doherty III that Three Million Seven Hundred Ninety-Eight Thousand Six Hundred Ninety-Eight Dollars (\$3,798,698) be appropriated from Available Funds "Free Cash" to acquire by gift, purchase, eminent domain or otherwise all or a portion of the property or any interest therein, including any structures and improvements thereon and temporary access easements therein, located at 333 Andover Street and shown on Assessors Map R1 as Lot 21A, for municipal purposes of locating a fire/police substation or other municipal facility thereon and/or for active and passive

recreational uses, as determined by the Select Board to be in the best interest of the Town, including all costs incidental and related thereto including, but not limited to, appraisal and assessment costs; and further to authorize the Select Board to acquire said property by gift, purchase, eminent domain or otherwise and take such actions and execute such documents and agreements as are necessary to effectuate the purposes of this article.

Finance met prior to the Town Meeting and voted to approve this article

A motion was made by Karen West, 2 Birchwood Road, and seconded by John Doherty to move the question.

The moderator declared the motion as passed.

With a teller vote of 148 yes and 3 no the moderator declared the motion as voted.

The Moderator explained that articles that contain capital expenditure are taken up sequentially and they will vote on Article 46 at this point.

VOTED: Motion was moved by Jeffrey Nesbaugh, 8 Patch's Pond Lane, and duly seconded by the floor that the Town vote, pursuant to Chapter 64, Section 64-1 of the Inhabitant By-laws, to rename the second-floor conference room at the Wilmington Memorial Library the Christina Stewart Room, and to have a sign installed to commemorate the same.

The moderator declared the motion as voted unanimously.

ARTICLE 42. (Drawn as #44) To see if the Town will vote to authorize the transfer of the care, custody, management, and control of a certain parcel of land owned by the Town of Wilmington hereafter described to the Selectmen of the Town of Wilmington, said land having been determined to be no longer needed for any municipal purpose, and for the express purpose of conveying the same, all in accordance with Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 30B; and further that the Selectmen be and hereby authorized to grant and convey such interest in the land as is owned by the Town of Wilmington and for the express purpose of constructing a municipal turnaround for Polk Street (formerly Cedar Street) upon such terms and conditions as shall be determined by the Selectmen in accordance with Chapter 3, Section 16 of the By-laws of the Inhabitants of the Town of Wilmington Revised. Said parcels and interest are described as a portion of Map 6, Parcels 33 and 34; more particularly described as lots 281, 282, 283, 2284 as shown on a plan of land entitled "Wilmington Gardens Addition" recorded with the Middlesex North Registry of Deeds Plan Book 26, Plan 36 and containing approximately 10,000 square feet of land for a sum no less than \$5,000; or take any other action related thereto.

The moderator explained that the land needs to be declared surplus. Jeff Hull stated that this was not declared surplus.

VOTED: Motion was moved by Finance Committee Chair John Doherty III and seconded by Finance Committee Vice Chair Lilia Maselli to pass over the article.

The Moderator declared that the motion was Unanimously voted to pass over article 45.

ARTICLE 46. (addressed as 41) To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of One Million Five-Hundred Thousand dollars (\$1,500,000), more or less, to be expended under the direction of the Superintendent of Schools in consultation with the School Committee, Wildwood School Building Committee, and the Town Manager for the purpose of constructing a safe and conducive learning environment including site preparation, design costs, costs to retrofit and or build age-appropriate restrooms for Pre-K and Kindergarten students, costs to build age-appropriate play structures, equipping and furnishing classrooms for Pre-K and Kindergarten students to be educated at the Wilmington Middle School, and all such costs incidental and related thereto to provide a safe and conducive learning environment; with funding for said appropriation anticipated as follows:

The Petitioner was not present to submit a motion.

VOTED: Motion was moved by Finance Committee Chair John Doherty III seconded by the floor to pass over this article

The Moderator explained that they could make a motion to reconsider the vote.

Susanne Sullivan made a motion to lay article 46 on the table and was seconded by the floor.

Town Council explained that the motion to table will be referring to the motion to pass over. He recommended that they lay the article on the table. We then listen to the Superintendants reports. Once they have heard the report, the moderator will then ask for a motion to revisit the motion to pass over article 46.

Selectboard Member Kevin Caira asked the Moderator for Town Councils opinion. He would like clarification on the order of the motions.

Town Council gave the opinion that the motion to lay on the table would be for the motion to pass over Article 46. Not to lay Article 46 on the table. If the registered voters voted down the motion to pass over, they could then make a motion to lay on the table Article 46 until the reports are given. They could then take up Article 46.

Susanne Sullivan withdrew the motion to table the motion to lay on the table the motion to pass over.

The Moderator opened comments regarding the motion to pass over the article.

The Moderator declared that the motion to pass over the article was unanimously voted.

Superintendent of Schools, Dr. Glen Brand, presented a report on the renovations to the middle school to accommodate the Wildwood School Students there. He also presented a report on the Wildwood MSBC Grant Building Project.

ARTICLE 47. (*Drawn as # 43*) To see if the Town will vote to amend Section 4.1.9 of the Wilmington Zoning Bylaw, which currently reads as:

"4.1.9 Fairs, Bazaars, Antique Shows and Carnivals - In all districts, any building or premises owned or operated by a municipal or religious organization or private lodge or club may be used with the owner's permission for fairs, bazaars, antique shows, or similar events. The finance committee met before the Town Meeting and voted to recommend disapproval. They felt an appointed board would be preferred over an elected one.

With a teller vote of 100 yes and 5 no the moderator declared the motion as passed.

With all business concluded at the April 29, 2023 Town Meeting, a Motion to adjorn was made by A motion was made by Moderator Jonathan Eaton and seconded by Finance Committee Chair John F. Doherty to adjourn the meeting. Voted.
