## From the Manager's Desk



**O**n Sunday afternoon, March 18, the TD Garden in Boston was awash in Wildcat Blue and White as Wilmington fans gathered en masse to watch the Wilmington High School Boys Ice Hockey Team take on Franklin High School. As everyone knows by now, Wilmington fans were not disappointed as the Wildcats skated to an impressive 3-2 victory to capture the school's first ever Massachusetts State Championship in boys ice hockey.

Despite a strong first year showing in the Middlesex League, many "experts" felt the Wildcats would not survive the rigors of tournament play. How wrong they were! The Wildcats defeated four teams to reach the finals, three of which were rivals from their former league, Cape Ann, and one of which was top seed Lynnfield. Congratulations to long-time coach Steve Scanlon and his hardworking staff and special congratulations to the boys ice hockey team whose athleticism, hard work and teamwork brought a championship banner to Wilmington High School.



"If I were elected leader of my community, I would make a difference by..." That was the challenge posed by the Massachusetts Municipal Association (MMA) to sixth grade students throughout Massachusetts who were invited to compose an essay describing how they would make a difference in their own community. More than 1,300 students from nearly 100 school systems participated in this year's contest and it was **Wilmington Middle School student Robert Sica who came away with top honors**. Congratulations to Robert who, with his family and teachers, attended the annual MMA banquet in Boston where Robert read his essay to several hundred community leaders from across the state.

Residents are encouraged to attend the Annual Town Meeting on Saturday, May 5, 2012 at 10:30 a.m. at the Wilmington High School Cushing Gymnasium. Prior to the meeting, every household will be mailed a copy of the Town Meeting Warrant which details the proposed fiscal year 2013 operating budget and 37 other articles that have been submitted by the Town and by resident petitioners. Residents will be asked to consider funding several important capital spending requests including the purchase of a 20+ acre former farm site located at 9 Cross Street and commonly referred to as Yentile Farm. The acquisition of this property would enable the eventual development of fields and other recreational spaces including walking trails while preserving much of the property as open space.

Selectmen have entered into a purchase and sale agreement with the owner, Century Bank and Trust Company, that is subject to a favorable vote at Town Meeting. The purchase price has been established at \$1,182,500 which is about \$2.6 million less than the price paid for the property when originally sold by the Yentile family. Funds to pay for this acquisition would come from surplus revenue and not from new taxes or from a borrowing.

## RECYCLING ENFORCEMENT

In order to improve participation in the Town's mandatory recycling program, the Department of Public Works (DPW) conducted a Town-wide visual recycling survey in neighborhoods during days of curbside recycling. The survey concluded that many households in Wilmington are still not participating in the Town's curbside recycling program.

As a reminder, participation in Wilmington's recycling program is mandatory under the Town's current "Recycling By-law" which is included in the "By-laws of the Inhabitants of the Town of Wilmington, Revised", Chapter 5, Section 2A. The by-law states in part:

"...residents of every household are required to separate recyclable material from the solid waste stream...**Failure to separate recyclable material from the solid waste stream may result in failure of the solid waste collection contractor to collect solid waste from the residence which violates this By-Law.**"

Please note that recycling is also mandatory under Massachusetts State Law, 310 CMR 19.017.

Beginning this spring, the Town of Wilmington will begin to attach tickets onto trash barrels that have visible recyclables present in the trash. This will serve as a reminder to the resident to begin and/or better manage their household recycling program as full enforcement of the by-law will be occurring this summer.

**As the recycling enforcement program progresses, the Town intends to enforce the mandatory recycling by-law by refusing to pick up weekly rubbish for any household that does not have a recycling container at curbside during their recycling day, or otherwise appears to not be participating in the recycling program. Please leave emptied recycling containers curbside until such time as your rubbish is picked up to avoid the appearance of non-participation in the recycling program. The Town plans to begin full recycling by-law enforcement starting July 1, 2012.**

### POLICE DEPARTMENT TO CONDUCT R.A.D. TRAINING

The Rape Aggression Defense (R.A.D.) training system is a program of realistic, self-defense tactics and techniques. The program includes a comprehensive training course for women that begins with awareness, prevention, risk reduction and avoidance, and progresses to the basics of hands-on defense training. (It is not a Martial Arts program.) The courses are taught by certified R.A.D. Instructors and participants are provided with a workbook/reference manual. This manual outlines the entire physical defense program for reference and continuous personal growth.

**The Wilmington Police Department is currently accepting applications for its next program which begins May 7.** All women, regardless of residence, are encouraged to apply. First time applicants will be given preference. Applicants under the age of eighteen must also complete and submit a Parental Consent Form. ### TOWN OF WILMINGTON SCHOLARSHIP FUND

Wilmington residents seeking to further their post secondary school or college education may apply for assistance from the Town of Wilmington Scholarship Fund. Applications are available at the Roman House, Town Hall, Wilmington High School, Shawsheen Tech and the Library. The **application deadline is April 13**. Since 1996, this program has distributed \$81,500 in financial aid to 138 scholarship recipients. Thanks to the generosity of Wilmington residents and businesses and the establishment of the "Loddy Weisberg and Lena Leiter Student Scholarship Fund", the Committee expects to award a greater amount of scholarships in June of this year. Ms. Weisberg and Ms. Leiter were sisters who both taught in the Wilmington Public School System for many years. The beloved teachers' affection for Wilmington students is reflected by their decision to include in their estate the distribution of scholarship funds to Wilmington students.

This new funding source will increase and help to perpetuate the Town's ability to distribute financial aid to Wilmington students. Individuals, community groups and businesses wishing to contribute to the Town of Wilmington Scholarship Fund may contact the Town Treasurer's office or the Town Manager's office. Additionally, scholarship donation forms are included with each property tax bill mailing.

## SPRING YARDWASTE COLLECTION PROGRAM

The Town will collect leaves and grass clippings placed in biodegradable paper bags or uncovered barrels at curbside on regular trash collection days during the weeks of **April 9, April 23 and May 7**.

The Recycling Center, located off Old Main Street at the Wilmington/Woburn line, will be **open for leaf and brush drop-off** in accordance with the following schedule:

**Wednesdays: 8 a.m. - 2 p.m.**  
**Saturdays: 9 a.m. - 4 p.m.**

on the following dates:

**April 4, 7, 11, 14, 18, 21, 25 and 28**  
**May 2, 5, 9 and 12**



Only Wilmington residents will be allowed to use the facility for leaves and brush drop-off. Residents must show an ID at the entrance to the facility. **No grass clippings will be accepted. No contractors or commercial vehicles will be allowed.** Residents using the Recycling Center must purchase a punch card for \$15 which will be good for 5 visits to the center. Punch cards may be purchased Monday-Friday, 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. at the Treasurer's Office at Town Hall. **Cards purchased previously that have unpunched visits are still valid.**

A **Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day** is scheduled for **Saturday, May 12 from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. at the West Intermediate School parking lot, 22 Carter Lane.** Details of this event will appear in the local papers in late April. ## NATIONAL DRUG TAKE BACK DAY

Once again the Town of Wilmington is joining with communities across the country to sponsor a "Drug Take Back Day". Working with the federal Drug Enforcement Agency, the Wilmington Police Department and Board of Health will conduct this important program on **Saturday, April 28 at the Public Safety Building. From 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.**, the public may anonymously surrender expired, not needed or unused prescription and non-prescription medications for destruction. Residents are reminded that medications should not simply be "thrown away" or flushed down the toilet.
