To the Voters of Wilmington:

This booklet contains the Warrant Articles for the 2015 Annual Town Meeting to be held at the High School Auditorium at 10:30 am on Saturday, May 2, 2015.

Article 5 is the Fiscal Year 2016 Town Budget. Beginning in February 2015, the Finance Committee has held many budget meetings with the Town Manager, Assistant Town Manager, the various Department heads and the Superintendents of the Wilmington Public Schools and Shawsheen Valley Regional Technical High School. Our meetings were focused on a variety of points, the various services provided to the residents by the Town, enhancements to technology, improved customer service to the residents from the various departments of the Town and Capital Improvements. In addition, the Finance Committee examined the expenses of the Town and if there was any way to reduce them without affecting the current level of services. The Wilmington Public Schools have two Capital Warrant Articles for the implementation of the K-5 Math Curriculum and the new English Arts Curriculum. In conclusion, it was evident that the Town Manager has presented a budget that will maintain/enhance current services, provide funds for capital improvements that will come out of the operating budget and not need a debt exclusion to fund them, increase funding to our Other Post Retirement Benefits Fund obligation and the Retirement Stabilization Fund. The Finance Committee recommends adoption of the Fiscal Year 2016 Budget as presented.

In March the Finance Committee, with the Planning Board, held a Public Hearing on all the Articles within this Warrant. Our recommendations are listed by each Article. There are several Articles that do need to be addressed. First, Article 34 is the demolition of the Whitefield School. The Finance Committee recommends this structure be taken down. The building is not architecturally significant and has no historical value. Second, Article 48 is requesting the rezoning of 5.4 acres in the Fosters Pond area of the Wilmington/Andover town line. This area has public and private conservation land that is open to the public for recreational use. The Finance Committee and Planning Board recommend disapproval of this Article. Finally, Article 51 is seeking to rezone the parcel(s) from R20 to NB. All the surrounding properties are residential and businesses that are acceptable in NB, such as retail stores under 30,000 square feet, banks, professional offices to name a few. The proposed rezoning would be out of place in this area and create a hardship for the area residents. The Finance Committee and Planning Board recommends is approved and planning Board recommend disapproval.

Please consider the recommendations of the Finance Committee and Planning Board when you cast your vote at Town Meeting.

The Committee would like to thank the Town Manager, Assistant Town Manager, Department Heads and the Superintendents of the Wilmington Public Schools and Shawsheen Valley Technical Regional High School for their time and effort in the review of the Budget and Articles.

WARRANT ANNUAL TOWN MEETING AND ELECTION

TO: EITHER OF THE CONSTABLES OF THE TOWN OF WILMINGTON: **GREETINGS**:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts and in the manner prescribed in the By-laws of said Town, you are hereby directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town qualified to vote in Town affairs to meet and assemble at the Boutwell School (Precincts 1 and 2), Wildwood School (Precincts 3 and 4) and the Town Hall Auditorium (Precincts 5 and 6), Saturday the twenty-fifth day of April, A.D. 2015 at 7:45 o'clock in the forenoon, the polls to be opened at 8:00 a.m. and shall be closed at 8:00 p.m. for the election of Town Officers:

<u>ARTICLE 1.</u> To bring in your votes on one ballot respectively for the following named offices to wit: One Selectman for the term of three years; two members of the School Committee for the term of three years; one Moderator for the term of three years; one member of the Housing Authority for the term of five years and one member of the Regional Vocational Technical School Committee for the term of three years.

You are also hereby further required and directed to notify and warn the said inhabitants of the Town of Wilmington who are qualified to vote on elections and Town affairs therein to assemble subsequently and meet in the Town Meeting at the Wilmington High School Auditorium, Church Street, in said Town of Wilmington on Saturday the second day of May, A.D. 2015 at 10:30 a.m., then and there to act on the following articles:

<u>ARTICLE 2.</u> To hear reports of Committees and act thereon.

<u>ARTICLE 3.</u> To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, transfer from available funds, or borrow pursuant to any applicable statute a sum of money for the purpose of paying unpaid bills of previous years; or take any other action related thereto.

<u>ARTICLE 4.</u> To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Treasurer/Collector, with the approval of the Selectmen, to enter into an agreement, under the provisions of Chapter 44, Section 53F of the Massachusetts General Laws, with one or more banks doing business in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts during Fiscal Year 2016 for a term not to exceed three years, which will permit the Town of Wilmington to maintain funds on deposit with such institutions in return for said institutions providing banking services; or take any other action related thereto.

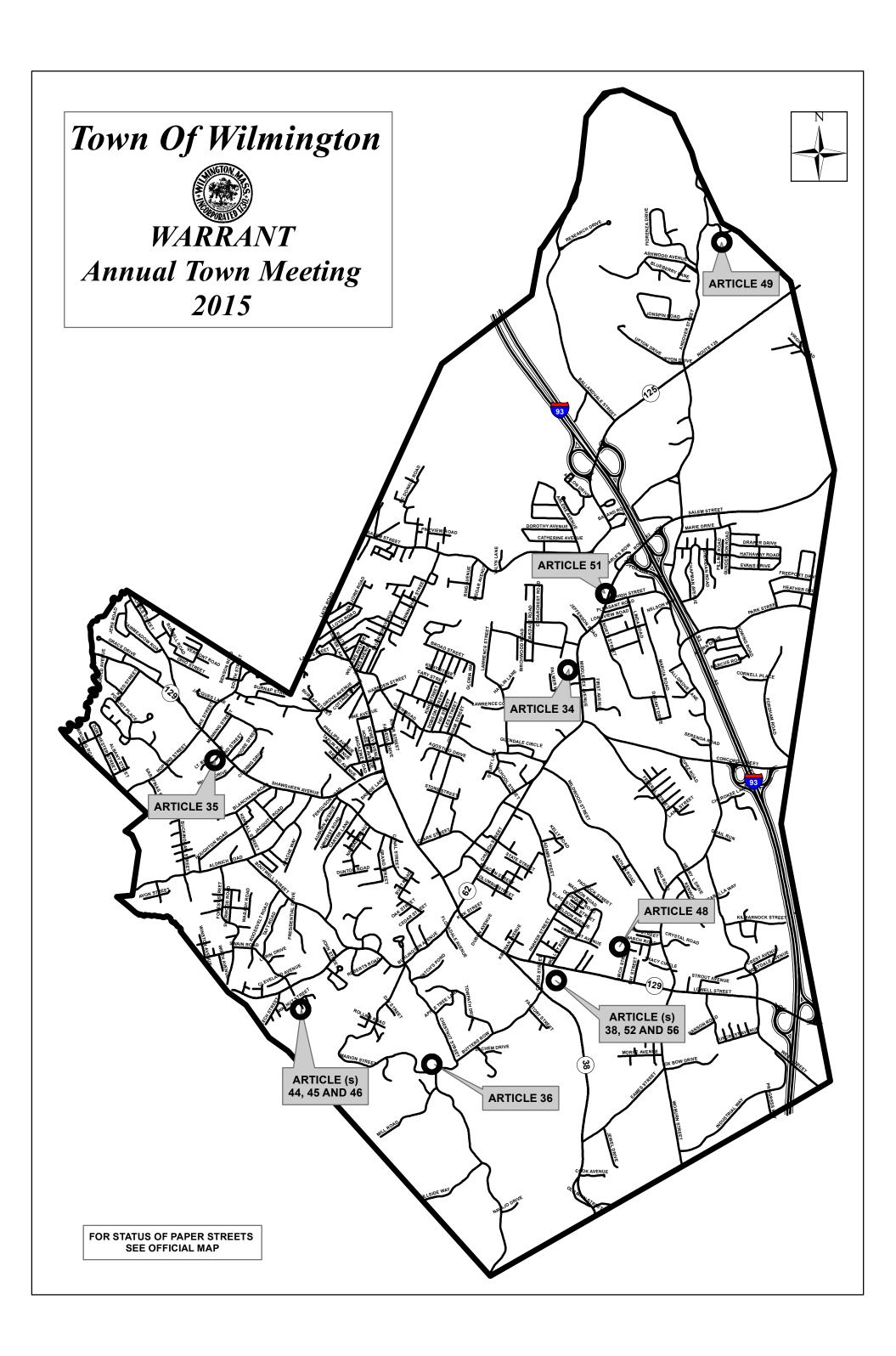

YENTILE FARM RECREATIONAL FACILITY

Since 1934 this farm and property has been a landmark to the people of Wilmington, the Town itself and widely known to surrounding communities who's towns people visited this farm for flowers, fresh vegetables, Christmas Trees, mulch, loam and friendship. The Yentile Farm, closing in 2005, was one of the last fully operational farms in Wilmington with many acres of planted crops, green houses, farm stand and farm livestock. Out of the eleven dairy farms once active in this Town, the Yentile Farm was the very last working dairy farm in Wilmington with over one hundred head of cattle. The Yentile's and

the Yentile Farm provide fresh food to the United States Army during World War II, produce to Wilmington businesses such as Market Basket and Stelio's Restaurant, Memorial Day Geraniums for United States Military Veterans' Graves, hay and pumpkins to the Town for Halloween parades and Holiday Wreaths to Wilmington Churches. Rocco and Rose Yentile passed the farm down to their seven children (Frank "Tony", Samuel "Sam", Vincent "Vinnie", Viola "Vicki", Theresa "Terry", Rocco Jr. "Rocky" and Joseph) who ran the farm until they reached into their eighties and could no longer physically operate the farm. The decision to cease the farm operations was heartbreaking for the entire family.

Of the Yentile family, Frank Yentile, a life long Wilmington resident who raised a family in town, a **Merchant Marine**, a **US Army WWII Veteran (1940)** and retired as a Custodian for the Town of Wilmington; Vincent Yentile, a life long Wilmington resident who raised a family in town, a **US Army Korean War Veteran (1951)**; Rocco Yentile, a life long resident of Wilmington, a **US Army Korean War Veteran (1953)**, a **Wilmington "Call Fireman" since 1950** and retired as the Head of the Wilmington Water Department; Herbert Garey, husband of Therese Yentile, a **US Army Korean War Veteran (1952)** and two other members of the Yentile Family both of whom are life long residents of Wilmington, one recently retiring as a Custodial Foreman for the Town of Wilmington and the other currently employed by the Town of Wilmington. With this history it is very easy to see that there is a long, deep-rooted connection between the Yentile Farm, the Yentile Family and the Town of Wilmington.

The Yentile family, their children and grandchildren have grown up as natives of Wilmington, attended Wilmington Schools and have long supported the Wilmington Community. This property has been known as "Yentile's" or "Yentile Farm" since 1934. Along with this well known fact the Town, the townspeople and surrounding communities have referenced this property as the "Yentile Farm" at every Town Meeting, PowerPoint presentation, video, site plan, newspaper article and event regarding this property and the soon to be built recreational field since its beginning. The Yentile Farm itself, the press coverage and Town proposals have already instilled the Yentile Farm name as the property and recreational project name and continued landmark within this community and surrounding towns. The Yentile Farm name will forever be synonymous with this property. This project further leaves many options for the naming of many other areas within the **Yentile Farm Recreational Facility** such as but not limited to: the proposed football field, gardens and benches etc.

The lease shall include adequate ice time to be given to Wilmington High School Hockey which shall have first choice of the available ice times.

Advertising for procurement for this privately enterprise run facility shall be a minimum of 4 months.

Any design work and engineering already contacted by the Town of Wilmington shall be provided to the private enterprise at no cost to them.

All existing contractual obligations by the Town of Wilmington shall be met. If escape clauses exist in contracts they shall be exercised so as to not cost the Town of Wilmington any further money; or take any other action related thereto.

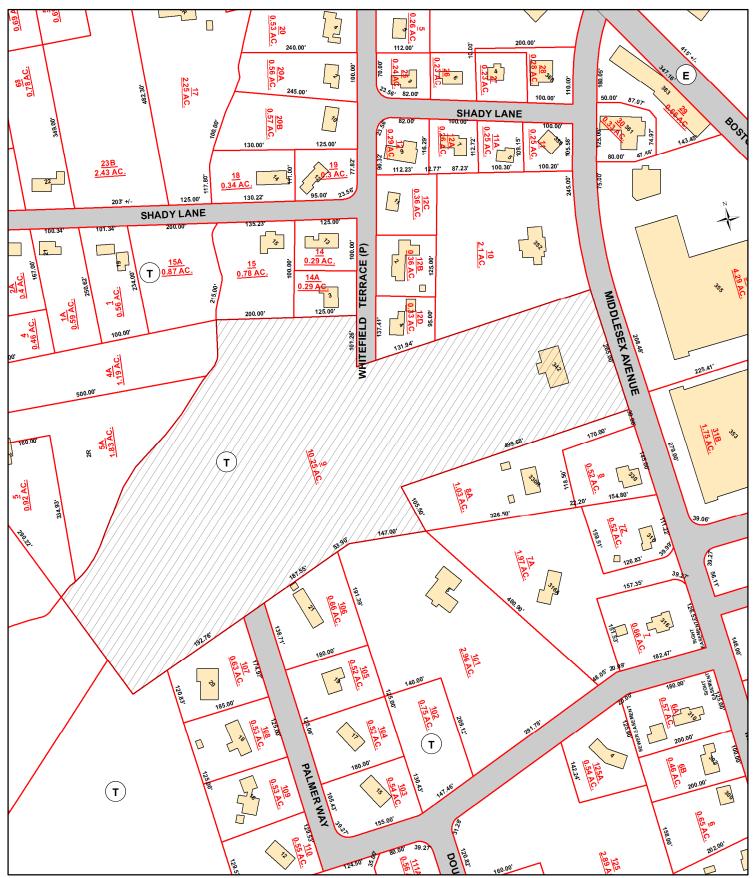

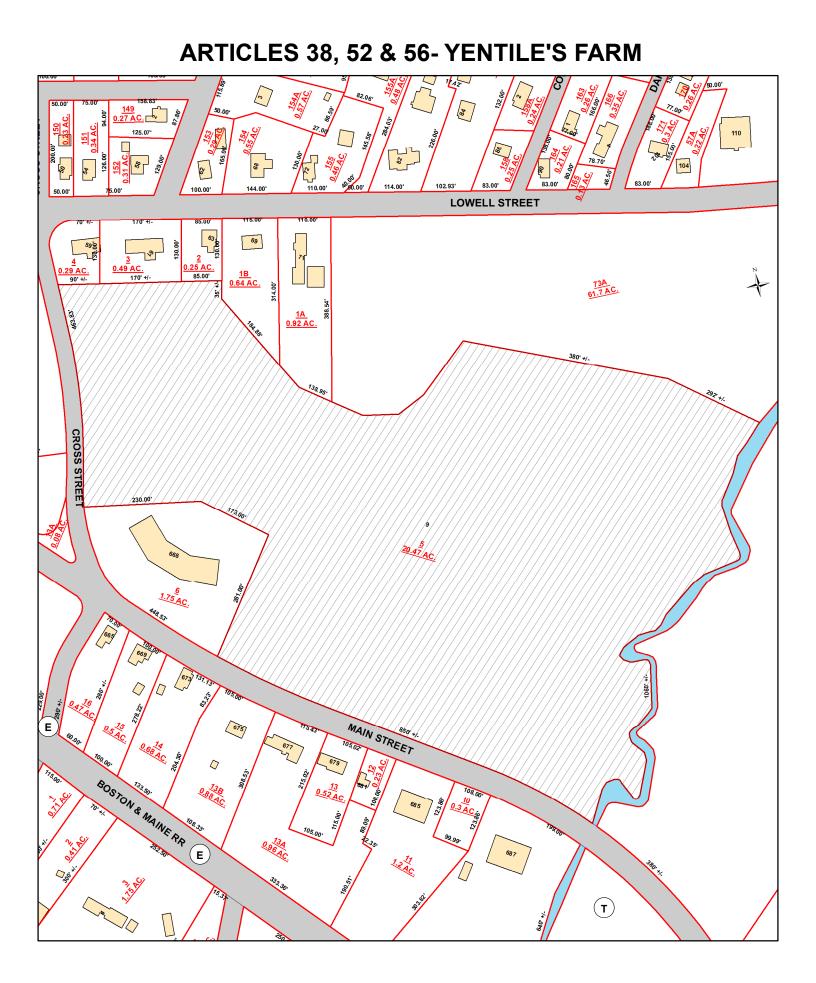
ARTICLE 34- WHITEFIELD SCHOOL

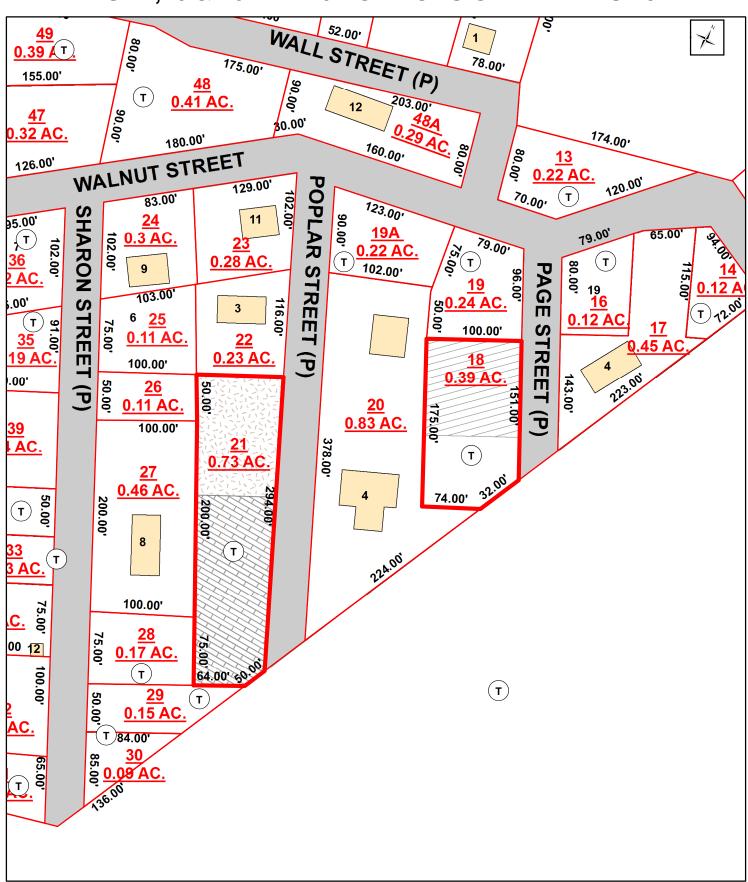


ARTICLE 35- LT BUCK DRIVE

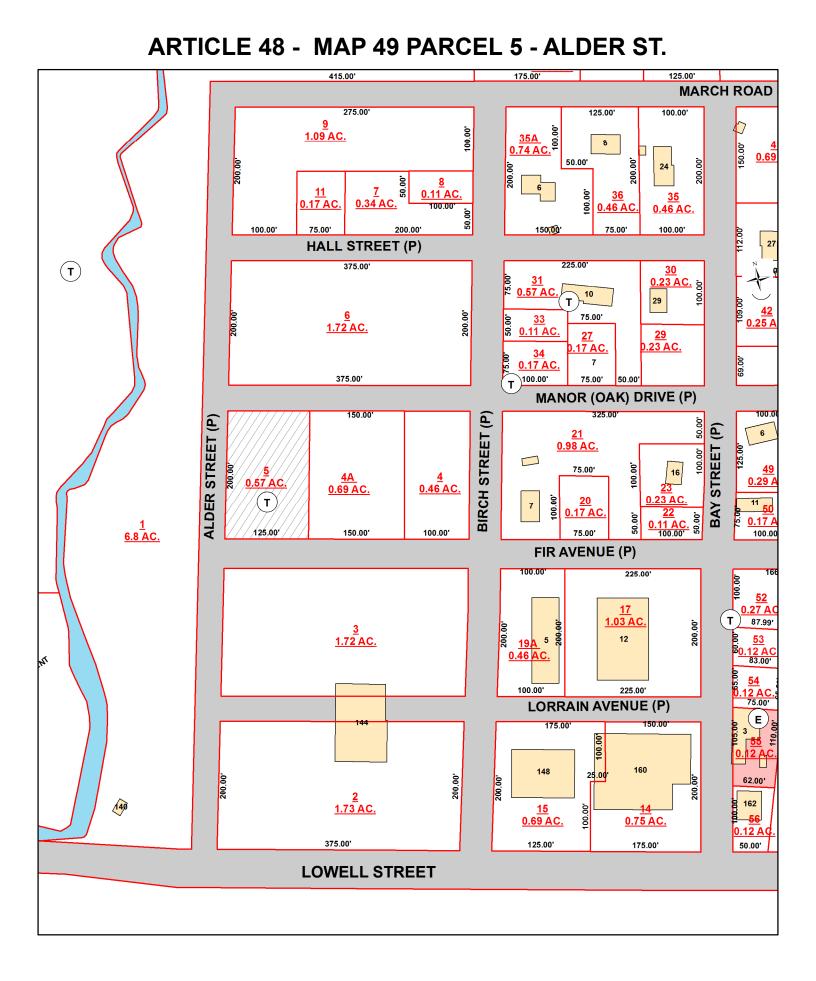






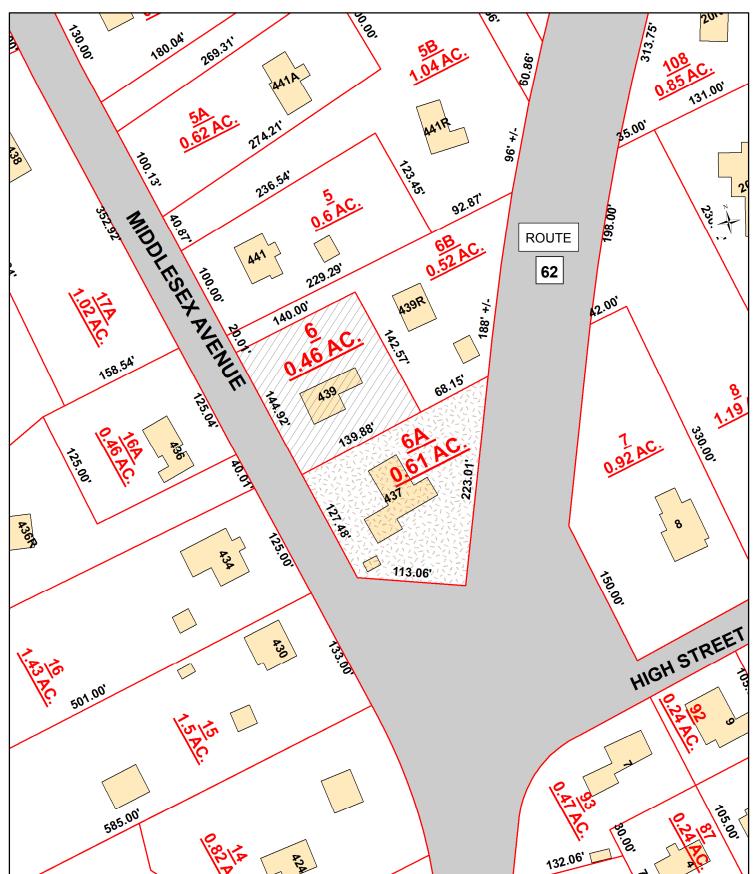


ARTICLES 44,45 & 46- MAP 6 PORTIONS OF PARCELS 18 AND 21

<u>Town of Wilmington</u> Finance Terminology

The following terms are frequently used in this report and at Town Meeting. In order to provide everyone with a better understanding of their meaning, the following definitions are provided:

APPROPRIATE: To appropriate is to authorize the spending of a specific sum from public funds. This is the business of an annual town meeting. Once an appropriation of an operating budget or an article has been made by Town Meeting, the appropriation can only be changed by another town meeting vote. The one exception to this is a transfer from the Reserve Fund.

ASSESSED VALUATION: A valuation set upon real estate or other property by the Town as a basis for levying taxes. The assessed valuation is not necessarily the same as the market value of a property.

CHERRY SHEET: Named for the cherry colored paper the State Dept. of Revenue uses to print it on. It shows the breakdown of State aid, lottery distributions and school aid as well as County and State charges against the Town. These figures must be used by the Assessors in determining the amount to be raised by taxation.

FISCAL YEAR (F.Y.): The twelve month financial period used by town government which begins July 1 and ends June 30 of the following calendar year. The year is represented by the date on which it ends; i.e. July 1, 2014 to June 30, 2015 would be FY 2015, the current fiscal year. The budget proposed in this document is for FY 2016, extending from July 1, 2015 to June 30, 2016.

FREE CASH: An amount certified annually by the State Bureau of Accounts by deducting from surplus revenue all uncollected taxes for prior years. These funds may be used by a vote of the town meeting. A town cannot spend its Free Cash until the total sum has been certified by the State.

LEGAL LEVY LIMIT: The legal levy limit is the maximum annual increase allowed by the State Department of Revenue. It is calculated by multiplying the legal levy limit from the prior year by 1.025 then adding local "New Growth". This limit on the increase of the levy never changes except for an override vote or by the addition of "New Growth" to the taxable base.

NEW GROWTH: Any new construction or the lots of a subdivision which are taxed as separate parcels for the first time are considered New Growth in the year they are added to the tax rolls. New Growth also includes any property whose assessed valuation increases by 50% or more in any one calendar year because of renovations or additions. In the case of commercial or industrial property, it is any increase in valuation over \$100,000 which occurs in one year due to new construction or renovation. Use of New Growth allows a town to increase its levy limit to accommodate the increasing demands for services that come with growth.

OPERATING BUDGET: Plan of proposed expenditures by a department, board or unit of government for personnel, supplies, maintenance and other expenses for the coming fiscal year.

OVERLAY: The overlay is the amount raised by the Assessors in excess of appropriations and other charges primarily for the purpose of creating a fund to cover tax abatements.

OVERLAY RESERVE: This is the accumulated amount of the Overlay for various years not used or required to be held in the specific overlay account for a given year. It may be used by vote of the town for extraordinary or unforeseen purposes or voted into the Reserve Fund.

RAISE: To raise is to tax. The tax rate is dependent, to a large extent, on the amount "spent" at town meeting as is set by the Board of Assessors after the meeting.

RESERVE FUND: This fund is established by the voters at an annual town meeting only. It is an appropriation made to provide flexibility to meet extraordinary or unforeseen emergencies by town departments. It may not exceed 5% of the tax levy of the preceding year and is within the exclusive control of the Finance Committee.

<u>Town of Wilmington</u> Procedural Definitions

ADJOURN(MENT): To dissolve or end the meeting, unless a time to reconvene is specified, as is done in the Town By-laws to stipulate the continuation of the Annual Town Meeting from Election Day to the following Saturday at 10:30 a.m.

AMENDMENT: A change made to a motion.

ANNUAL TOWN MEETING: The April meeting mandated by the Town By-laws; includes Town Election Day and the budget.

APPEAL: To question a ruling made by the Moderator.

ARTICLE: An item of business to be discussed by the Town Meeting.

MEMBERS: The registered voters of Wilmington in attendance at Town Meeting.

MOTION: A formal proposal made to the meeting.

MOVE THE (PREVIOUS) QUESTION: To vote whether to end discussion or debate on a motion.

PASS OVER OR TAKE NO ACTION: To decide not to consider an article, but take up the next item of business.

POINT OF INFORMATION: To ask for clarification or an explanation.

POINT OF ORDER: To object when parliamentary procedure is not being followed.

POINT OF (PERSONAL) PRIVILEGE: To object to a personal affront, or to respond if one's name is mentioned.

QUORUM: The minimum number of people required to conduct a meeting. Section 19 of the By-laws: 150 registered voters at a Town Meeting shall be required to start the business of the Town including each adjourned session thereof and then no other quorum shall be required to conduct business.

RANDOM SELECTION: The drawing of articles from a container, rather than taking them up in numerical sequence as printed in the warrant, to assure impartiality.

RECESS: An intermission or temporary break in the proceedings.

RECONSIDERATION: To bring back an article or motion for further discussion after it has been voted.

RESCIND: To nullify a previous vote.

ROBERT'S RULES OF ORDER: A book of parliamentary procedures considered the standard guide to conducting meetings.

SIMPLE MAJORITY: More than half of the votes cast when a quorum is present.

SPECIAL TOWN MEETING: A meeting called at the discretion of the Board of Selectmen.

2/3 VOTE: Two-thirds of the votes cast when a quorum is present.

WARRANT: The formal announcement of a Town Meeting, including the list of business items to be considered.

WITHDRAW: To remove an article from the meeting's agenda.
