



Wilmington residents have a strong sense of community and strive to keep their town a beautiful place to live, work, and explore.
Wilmington has a number of public trails and parks for residents to visit – with 8 different trail systems, which can be found <u>here</u>. A few of

the most popular parks being Town Park (including a dog park), Silver Lake, Rotary Park, and Yentile Farm, which includes walking paths, a turf field, a playground, and basketball courts. Wilmington also has wetlands to admire and be aware of, covering 19% of the Town's total area.

The Ipswich River has its headwaters in Wilmington, and most of the Town is located within the Ipswich River Watershed. Portions of town are located within the Shawsheen River Watershed, and a small section of the southeast corner is located within the Boston

Harbor Watershed.





- Wilmington, Massachusetts is in Middlesex County
- A suburban community with a population of approximately 23,000 people
- The average household income is \$166,442 (2021 ACS 5-Year Estimates)
- Wilmington is located about 16 miles north of Boston, with 4 exits off Interstate 93, a short drive to both routes 128 and 495, and 2 commuter rail stops – Lowell and Haverhill lines
- Main Street (Rt. 38) runs through Wilmington from Tewksbury to Woburn
- Middlesex Avenue (Rt. 62) runs from North Reading to Burlington

Pre-Permitting

1. TOWN GIS MAPS

Wilmington has several business zones, with different uses allowed in each. You can find out which zone your future business would be in by searching by address or parcel id (map-parcel). You can find the maps <u>here</u>.

Using the layers tab, check off "Zoning" and use the legend to identify which zone your future business is in.

2. ZONING & GIS

The Zoning Bylaw can be found <u>here</u>, which can be helpful to look at with the GIS maps. After finding which zone your future business would be in, refer to the zoning bylaws to confirm that your proposed use is allowed. For any further questions, contact the Building Inspector, who is also the Zoning Enforcement Officer.

3. WETLANDS & GIS

The GIS maps also show the general area of wetlands. This can be a good indicator if you will need to go through the Conservation Commission. But keep in mind; this is only if you will be doing exterior changes within 100' of wetlands. It is best to call the Planning & Conservation Department for guidance.

4. BUSINESS CERTIFICATE FORM

This form is for record keeping and administrative purposes. If something goes wrong at your business, people could contact the Clerk's office to notify you. This is a requirement from the State. Once complete, mail or bring the form to the Town Clerk's office, Room 12, in the Town Hall.

NOT SURE WHERE TO START? OR DON'T HAVE A BUSINESS LOCATION YET?

- Call the Department of Planning & Conservation or email the Economic Development Coordinator. The Department
 deals with issuing different types of permits and typically has information on open storefronts and empty parcels for
 potential development.
- The Department also has a general understanding of the overall permitting process, which can be beneficial for beginners who are seeking guidance. If you are looking for something they don't typically deal with, they will help lead you in the right direction and get in touch with the proper individuals.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT

BUILDING INSPECTOR

The Building Inspector (also the Zoning Enforcement Officer) issues building permits for interior and exterior work including the installation of signs. A Building Permit should be filled out and signed by the Treasurer prior to the start of review from other departments. The Building Department is also the home of the Board of Appeals which issues special permits & variances.



THE DEPARTMENT OF PLANNING & CONSERVATION

SIGNS

 Signs must be reviewed by both the Building Department and the Planning & Conservation Department. Sign allowances and requirements are included in the Zoning Bylaw under Section 6.3.
 Special Permits may be granted by the Planning Board for certain signs that do not comply with the Zoning Bylaw.

WETLAND RESOURCE AREAS

 Changes to the project site may also require review and approval from the Conservation Commission, depending on how far the proposed work is from a wetland resource area. Contact the Planning & Conservation Department for more information.

EXTERIOR CHANGES

 If you are changing the use of the building or proposing exterior changes to the building or the site (parking, landscaping, etc.), the site plan must be reviewed and approved by the Wilmington Planning Board. Planning Board applications may be downloaded <u>here</u>. When you reach this part of the process, call the Department of Planning & Conservation to get a better understanding on the review process and if a filing is needed.

OTHER DEPARTMENTS THAT MAY BE INVOLVED ARE...



DPW/Engineering

The Department of Public Works (DPW) issues Street Opening Permits for any work within a Right of Way, including utility work in streets. DPW also reviews all utility connections (drainage, water, and sewer).

Street Opening Permits for non-emergency purposes are only issued between April 15 and November 15. The Engineering Division will inspect any site work associated with your project.



Fire Department

The Wilmington Fire Department will also take part in the review process if your business requires any physical changes to the building.

The Fire Department will review your plans and building permits for code compliance.

The Fire Department also reviews the following: changes in hazards, change in occupancy/use classifications, and changes in storage or other conditions that may affect fire protection.

THINGS TO CONSIDER

ADDITIONAL THINGS THAT MAY APPLY TO YOU AND YOUR BUSINESS



- Each type of use has specific parking requirements for the site. The parking requirement is listed in the Wilmington Zoning Bylaw under section 6.4. If you need to request a change in use, the parking requirement may change. Contact the Building Inspector regarding the parking requirement for your specific use (even if you are a tenant in a building). The Planning & Conservation Department is available to discuss the site plan with you during the planning process if needed.
- Boards and Commissions meet once or twice a month to review and approve permits and license applications. Permitting could take a few months depending on the scope of the project and the type of approvals needed, so be sure to start the process as early as feasible. A <u>full</u> <u>schedule</u> of the Town Board and Commission meetings can be accessed on the Town's website.
- Most of Wilmington is not connected to a sewer system and instead utilizes on-site septic systems for wastewater. Requirements for system size and design will vary with business type. Contact the Board of Health to review plans early on in your planning process.
- There are various uses that require a Special Permit from the Planning Board, a list of applications can be found <u>here</u>. Other uses in certain zoning districts may require a Special Permit from the Board of Appeals. Call the Building Department if you are unsure of your use.
