From the Manager's Desk



Town staff, the Owners Project Manager and the designers for both the Senior Center and the Town/School Administration Building projects, are finalizing the procurement of construction services for both projects. Construction activities for the new senior center will get under way this fall with construction of the new Town/School Administration Building starting in March of 2024.

Consigili Construction Company, the general contractor for the Town/School Administration Building, will fence off a significant portion of the Swain parking area to serve as a work zone for building construction, materials storage and parking for construction workers. The Swain parking lot and green are a focal point for a variety of community events which provide activities for residents while providing local non-profit organizations with the opportunity to raise much needed funds for their programs. A final plan for the use limitations of the Swain parking area will be established within the next few weeks and discussed with the Select Board. The Town will work to identify alternative locations for the many local organizations that have historically utilized the Swain parking area and green to remain connected to the community.

Modifications to the Middle School to repurpose the former media center and classrooms in that section of the building were completed by early September. This area will now serve to accommodate students and staff displaced from the Wildwood Early Childhood Center. This area is expected to serve the pre-kindergarten and kindergarten populations formerly served by the Wildwood School until a new school can be constructed.

The Town is currently in the feasibility study phase of the Wildwood School building project which requires approximately 16 months to complete. Dore & Whittier, the Town's project architect, has completed an existing building conditions assessment of the Wildwood School, the Woburn Street School and the North Intermediate School. This work included evaluating the condition of the building envelope, floors, mechanical systems, structural integrity along with a hazardous materials survey, geotechnical survey and preliminary wetlands survey. In accordance with the Massachusetts School Building Authority (MSBA) requirements, existing buildings must be evaluated for possible rehabilitation or expansion in addition to demolition and replacement with a new school. Meetings with school staff, along with public visioning sessions and forums, are intended to develop a preliminary design plan (PDP) and preferred schematic design (PSD) for submission to the MSBA. The PDP defines the programmatic, functional, spatial and environmental requirements for a new or rehabilitated school. The educational goals, space needs along with existing conditions in the three named schools and site development requirements will be critical information relied upon to prepare a recommendation for the most educationally appropriate and cost-effective approach for a school.

National Development, the owners of property located on Lowell Street formerly owned by Textron Defense Systems, and the Town have reached an agreement to lease the tennis courts, ballfields and parking area on Lowell Street. The lease takes effect on January 1, 2024 and will extend for a term of 99 years. This lease presents another opportunity to expand the recreational opportunities for residents. The existing conditions of the area will be assessed to determine the types of improvements required. The fact that this area borders the Yentile Farm Recreational Facility creates the future prospect of connecting the two recreational areas.

A warm welcome is extended to the new library director Kate-Lynn Coraccio. She comes to Wilmington with considerable experience in library services, having worked most recently as the Collection, Circulation, Community Branch and Bookmobile Manager for the City of Worcester Public Library system. She is very enthusiastic about her new role and will be a great addition to the management team. Residents are encouraged to visit the Wilmington Memorial Library to see the upgrades to the first floor area and to meet Ms. Coraccio.

As this will be my final edition of *From the Manager's Desk*, I extend my appreciation to the many capable and committed employees and board and committee members that I have had the good fortune to work with over my years in Wilmington. There are always areas for improvement and the employees and volunteers who serve the town will continue to pursue ways to enhance the services offered. Wilmington is a tight-knit community that never ceases to amaze me with respect to the selfless efforts of so many to assist other members of the community. It has been a privilege and a pleasure to serve you for the past 36 years.

YOUTH FOCUSED STUDY

Residents are reminded to have their Trash and Recycling placed curbside by **6:30 a.m.** on their collection day. Once trash and recycling have been collected, residents should pull their barrels off of the street.



Contamination levels in recycling have become a serious issue with recycled materials. Residents continue to include items that are not recyclable such as diapers, wood, gas jugs, paint cans, garden hoses, lights, party supplies (disposable dinnerware) and, worst of all, plastic bags of any kind. These items and others cannot be placed in recycling receptacles. Due to the current depressed recycling market conditions, there is zero tolerance for any unacceptable items without financial consequences for the Town. Please **DO NOT** include plastic bags in the recycling barrel. All soft plastics such as grocery bags, dry cleaning wraps, bread and produce bags, food storage bags and case wraps (plastic surrounding a case of water, a package of diapers or paper towels) must be kept out of your recycle container. Plastic grocery bags can be returned to the supermarket for recycling and other soft plastics may be disposed of in your trash. We want all to be aware of these facts to help with keeping Wilmington green and minimize the escalating costs for solid waste disposal.

Call this number for missed trash/recycling collection or to schedule a bulk item pickup. Every residence is allowed to dispose of <u>one</u> bulk item at a time. Bulk items include but are not limited to sofas, chairs, bureaus, tables and until October 31, mattresses and box springs.

If you move from your home, the trash and recycle barrels <u>must</u> remain with the house.

FROM THE FIRE DEPARTMENT

November 5th is the date to set clocks <u>back</u> one hour. The Fire Department recommends replacing the batteries in all Carbon Monoxide and Smoke Detectors including plug -in and hard-wired types, which usually have battery back up in case of power loss. Massachusetts Law requires replacement of smoke detectors after 10 years.

BASKETBALL

FALL YARDWASTE PROGRAM

The end of the year curbside pick-up of leaves and grass clippings will begin on October 23 and continue the weeks of October 30, November 13, November 27 and December 4. Residents should place their yardwaste in



biodegradable paper bags or uncovered barrels at curbside on their regular trash collection day. Yardwaste in plastic bags will not be accepted.

Residents may also use the recycling center off Old Main Street near the Woburn line for leaves and brush drop-off. **The center will open for 9 weeks on Wednesdays and Saturdays from October 4 through and including December 2**. Hours of operation are Wednesdays, 8 a.m. - 2 p.m. and Saturdays, 9 a.m. - 4 p.m.

In order to use the yardwaste recycling facility, residents must purchase a \$15 punch card which is good for five visits to the center. The card may be purchased at the Treasurer/ Collector's Office, Room 1, Town Hall. **Wilmington residents only** are allowed to use the facility for leaves and brush drop-off. NO GRASS CLIPPINGS. The punch card and an ID must be presented at the entrance. **No contractors or commercial vehicles** are allowed to use the facility.

PROTECT YOUR PIPES

染 As the colder weather approaches, residents are encouraged to review items around their home that need to be protected from freezing, especially water pipes and meters. Failure to properly prepare for the winter months can lead to freeze-ups, which leave residents without water. Since freeze-ups typically occur in the basement, it is important to eliminate cold drafts by securely closing windows and doors along with filling gaps with expandable foam insulation. Wrapping vulnerable pipes with pipe insulation is another step that helps to prevent freeze-ups. These maintenance items are inexpensive and may be purchased at any home improvement store. A few minutes of prevention this fall can save you from real troubles when the snow flies. Please take a moment to check these items in addition to winterizing your sill cocks, garden hoses and sprinkler systems before the holiday season.

SENIOR CITIZEN WORK PROGRAM

The Senior Citizen Work Program offers Wilmington residents the opportunity to work off a portion of their property tax by working part-time for the Town. The purpose of the program is to assist seniors in reducing their property tax burden. Participants MUST be Wilmington residents occupying a house for which property taxes are paid (or spouse of homeowner), have limited financial resources and be 60 years of age or older as of January 1, 2024. Applications are available in the Town Manager's Office and at the Buzzell Senior Center. **Application Deadline: October 27, 2023**. All seniors, regardless of past participation however, are encouraged to apply. Job listings and program information are on the application.
