From the Manager's Desk

\ \ \ / e have now passed the one year mark living and working in a COVID-19 environment and many have lamented about their COVID-fatigue for good reason. However, while COVID remains very much with us the number of residents testing positive and the number in quarantine is on the decline. Hopefully, the holiday surge at the end of 2020 will be the final surge for this pandemic. At present, there are three vaccines that have been approved by the Food and Drug Administration and, while the supply and distribution of vaccines have been problematic, as of March 5, 2021, 1,355,389 residents of the Commonwealth had received at least one dose and 650,411 residents had either received both doses or received the single dose required by the Johnson & Johnson version. The improving vaccination rate and ability to be outside due to warmer weather should work in our favor.

There is clear reason for optimism at the same time recognizing that to reach the "other side" of this pandemic is like running a marathon. Just as one can feel great at mile marker 18 and fall apart at mile marker 22 the number of COVID cases could increase unless we collectively remain disciplined with wearing masks, social distancing, handwashing and maintaining the habits that have become second nature. We must stay that course with our actions and, to use the refrain that those of us long-time Red Sox faithful know all too well, "Reverse the Curse."

It bears repeating that we owe a debt of gratitude to the staff of the health department, police, fire and dispatch personnel, public works crews, custodians and building maintenance workers, staff in elderly services, veterans' services, library and recreation departments and our administrative staff for remaining focused and finding "work arounds" to continue serving you the public during these most challenging times.

As we continue to adapt to the pandemic, Annual Town Meeting will once again be in a non-traditional location. Recognizing the continuing requirement for social distancing and the fickle nature of early spring in New England, Annual Town Meeting will be held indoors at the Shriners Auditorium on 99 Fordham Road in Wilmington on May 1st. The Shriners organization has been incredibly generous to the Town. Just within the past year the Shriners have graciously hosted the Presidential Election, the limited local vaccine clinic sponsored by the Health Department and will host the Annual Town Meeting each at no charge. The Shriners embody, as an organization, what Wilmington has become known for as a community — doing good for others. The new start time for the meeting is 9:00 a.m. Residents

who are interested in how your tax dollars are being spent are encouraged to attend.

Within the next thirty (30) to sixty (60) days two architect/design firms will be hired to work with the Town to evaluate the best sites for a new senior center and town/school administration building and to develop schematic designs and cost estimates for each project. This stage of the effort is expected to take at least six (6) to eight (8) months depending upon the ability to arrive at consensus around the location and preliminary design. Once this work is completed, articles would be prepared for an upcoming town meeting to seek funding for the continued services of an owners project manager along with funds for final design and construction.

Recently, Vincent McCoy, a Custodial Supervisor, retired after serving the Town over 33 years. Over the next three months the Town will say "good bye" to Tree Foreman Scott Smith after over 40 years of service, Police Officer Brian Moon after over 33 years of services and Lieutenant David Sugrue after 31 years of service. Each of them is wished the very best in the next stage of life's journey.

These past twelve (12) months have tested each of us in multiple and varied ways: isolation from family, keeping our kids engaged in learning, job loss or business closure, sickness and loss of loved ones. And yet we must keep on keeping on. In the words of tennis professional turned motivational speaker Roger Crawford "Being challenged in life is inevitable. Being defeated is optional." There are lessons for all of us to take from this experience. Let us identify them and take advantage of them.

TOWN OF WILMINGTON SCHOLARSHIP FUND

Wilmington residents seeking to further their post secondary school or college education may apply for assistance from the Town of Wilmington Scholarship Fund. Applications are available at the Roman House, Town Hall, Wilmington High School, Shawsheen Tech, Library and online at https://www.wpsk12.com/cms/ One.aspx?portalId=26809273&pageId=26932766

The application deadline is April 16. Since 1996, this program has distributed \$174,500 in financial aid to 270 scholarship recipients.

MULCH FIRE SAFETY

As the snow melts, our attention turns to beautifying our property. The state Fire Marshall offers the following information regarding Mulch Fire Safety:

Mulch is combustible and can catch fire easily when smoking materials are discarded in it. Hundreds of fires start this way each year. Learn to prevent mulch fires.

Mulch Regulation

REGULATIONS FOR SPREADING MULCH

- Regulations prohibit the new application of mulch within 18" of combustible exteriors of buildings, such as wood or vinyl, but not brick or concrete.
- Residential buildings with six units or less are exempt, but all homeowners may want to follow these safe practices. The regulation applies to all other buildings including commercial properties.

REGULATIONS FOR STORING AND MANUFACTURING MULCH

- ◆ Mulch pile size is limited because large piles can spontaneously combust from the heat they generate.
- There must be 30-feet between mulch piles. The distance prevents a fire in one from easily spreading to another or to a building.
- Permits are required from the fire department wherever more than 300 cubic yards of mulch is produced or stored.

Tips for Landscapers, Property Managers and **Building Owners**

- ◆ Keep wood mulch 18" away from combustible exteriors of buildings such as wood or vinyl siding. Do not put mulch against a building.
- Use materials such as pea stone or crushed rock for the first 18" as a barrier around the foundation of a building.
- Provide proper receptacles for smoking materials at entrances to buildings (place at least 18" away from the building) and in designated smoking areas. Empty regularly and do not mulch these areas.
- Train maintenance staff to watch for mulch fires, especially when mulch is fresh or weather is very hot and dry or windy.

ANNUAL TOWN CENSUS

Responses to Wilmington's Annual Town Census can be returned by mail in the return envelope, by email to townclerk@wilmington.gov or by dropping the census in the Town Hall drop slot, located next to the front door of Town Hall. Responding to the Annual Town Census keeps your name on the active voting list and enables the Office of the Town Clerk to confirm your residency in the future. If you are a voter and do not respond to the census, your name will be placed on the Inactive Voter List. Please contact the Town Clerk's office if you haven't received your census form.

DOG LICENSES

Dog registration renewals are ongoing. You must have an updated rabies certificate to complete your initial registration or renewal. New Dog Registrations are always ongoing. New registrations or renewals can be accomplished online or by mail, and in person once Town Hall has opened to the public. The cost is \$10 if your dog is spayed or neutered, \$15 if intact. Renewals submitted after April 1, 2021 will have a \$15 late fee assessed in addition to the registration fee. Renewals submitted after June 1, 2021 will have a \$50 civil fine assessed.

ANNUAL TOWN ELECTION AND MEETING

The Town Election will be held on Saturday, April **24, 2021**. The polls are open from 8:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m.



The last day to register to vote for the Annual Town Election is Monday, April 5, 2021. The Town Clerk's office will remain open until 8:00 p.m. on that day.

The **Annual Town Meeting** will be held the following Saturday, May 1, beginning at 9:00 a.m. at the Shriners Auditorium, 99 Fordham Road.

DAY OF REMEMBRANCE

Residents are invited to participate in Memorial Day observances commencing on Saturday, May 29 beginning at 8 a.m. with the decoration of veterans' graves at Wildwood Cemetery followed by the decoration of all squares and memorials. Family Walk in the Town Forest Wednesday, April 21, 10 am

Join Wilmington Conservation Agent Cameron Lynch for a walk along the trails of the 157-acre Town Forest, the largest piece of Conservation Land in Wilmington. Learn about the ecology, geology and human history that shaped and created the Town Forest. There will be activities for all ages, including a nature scavenger hunt for the whole family. Please dress appropriately for the weather. Hiking boots are recommended. This event is weather dependent, so check our website for updates. Parking is available at the Andover Street trailhead across from White Oak Drive (Andover). The walk will begin at 10 am. Please plan on arriving shortly before.

Vernal Pool Exploration Thursday, April 22, 6:30 pm

Explore and learn about vernal pools from local environmentalists and Headwaters Stream Team members Martha Stevenson and Suzanne Sullivan, who will lead a walk to find vernal pools in the area behind the library. Vernal pools serve as essential breeding habitats for certain species of wildlife, including salamanders and frogs, which provide an important food source for small carnivores as well as large game species. Please wear appropriate footwear and dress for the weather.

Trash to Treasure Saturday, April 24, 10 am - 12 pm

Help keep Wilmington beautiful. SPRING YARDWASTE COLLECTION PROGRAM

The Town will collect leaves and grass clippings placed in biodegradable paper bags or uncovered barrels at curbside on regular trash collection days during the weeks of April 5, April 20 and May 3.

No contractors or commercial vehicles will be allowed. Residents using the Recycling Center must purchase a punch card for \$15 which will be good for 5 visits to the center. Punch cards may be purchased Monday-Friday, 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. at the Treasurer's Office at Town Hall. Cards purchased previously that have unpunched visits are still valid.
