From the Manager's Desk



By an unprecedented margin, voters overwhelmingly approved both the plans and the financing for the construction of a new Wilmington High School. More than 75%

of the 5,016 residents who cast ballots in the December 6, 2011 Special Election voted in favor of a proposition 2 1/2 debt exclusion. The vote, 3,778 - 1,238, provides the Town with temporary additional taxing capacity enabling the Town to raise funds in excess of its levy limit.

The Town spoke with a near singular voice the following Saturday, December 10th, when nearly 98% of Special Town Meeting attendees (1,426-31) voted to appropriate \$81.5M to construct a new high school on the same grounds of the current site. The project is being financed jointly with the Massachusetts School Building Authority, the state agency that will provide the Town with \$38M in funding. The Town estimates that over the life of the 25 year bond that will be issued to finance the Town's share of the project, the average annual cost to the homeowner , based upon the average residential property value, will be approximately \$164.

The new high school will increase in size from 154,000 s.f. to just over 192,000 s.f. The high school is being designed to support 21st century learning with state-of-the-art mechanical and structural systems. The building will be fully air conditioned and heated by natural gas. It will meet the needs of present day educational programs and be designed to provide flexibility and functionality for future changes. The school will accommodate the growing use of technology, including wireless infrastructure, provide appropriate space for special education and student support services and offer flexible classrooms that are designed for large and small group instruction as well as guiet study and for interdisciplinary work. The building will include up-to-date science classrooms with modern laboratories to ensure high quality science education; expanded and improved visual arts, business and family consumer science classrooms; and a media production room for hosting multiple classes of students at one time for lectures, productions and distance learning opportunities.

Other features of the new school include:

- * A large interior courtyard that will connect to classrooms, the library/media center and the cafeteria and will allow natural light into all classrooms as well as provide outdoor seating for the cafeteria in the nicer weather.
- * A state-of-the-art auditorium with greater seating capacity and a larger stage to better accommodate student concerts and performing arts' productions.
- * A new gymnasium with an elevated track to support the wellness curriculum and winter sports teams.
- * Enhanced locker, weight and fitness rooms.
- * A new utility sports field, an improved track surface and a new artificial turf field for Alumni Stadium.
- * New outside tennis and basketball courts.
- * A sustainable designed building which will achieve energy efficiency and a LEED[®] Silver rating.
- * Improved parking and student drop-off areas.

It is anticipated that preliminary work on Alumni Field will begin in the spring. At the conclusion of the Town's 4th of July activities, work on the field and track surface will commence in order to accommodate a late August opening of Alumni Stadium. Sewer will be extended to the site in the summer of 2012 enabling the elimination of the septic system. In July of 2012, the gymnasium will be demolished. The current gym is the only part of the existing high school building that sits on the new building footprint. Construction on the new building is slated to begin in early Fall of 2012. The facility is expected to be substantially complete in early summer of 2014 and ready for occupancy by students and staff for the beginning of school in August of 2014. The current high school will be demolished to make room for the construction of a parking lot, new basketball and tennis courts and other site improvements. The new utility field off of Wildwood Street will be constructed near the end of the project.

A MESSAGE FROM THE WATER DEPARTMENT

Weather related problems, be it flooding, wind, ice or snow, seem to be occurring more frequently now than in past years. Any one of these climatic events can cause power outages and extended stays in one's home. The first step in preparing for such events is usually a trip to the local grocery store. Hoping to ride out the storm's fury, residents often stock up on the basic food staples, snacks and large purchases of bottled water. Seeing these large purchases of bottled water has prompted the Water Department to provide the following information to Wilmington residents:

The Wilmington water and sewer systems use significant amounts of electricity to pump potable and waste water to their proper locations. Each one of these facilities has backup generators that are tested weekly and are routinely maintained to keep them at peak operating condition. The generators are in place so that no matter what external conditions hamper the electrical systems, water and wastewater will continue to flow. In addition, the water system stores approximately two additional days of water supply for the Town in its three storage tanks. There would have to be a catastrophic incident to shut the water system down for any appreciable length of time.

So before making that next trip to your favorite market prior to a storm, rethink the need to purchase large quantities of expensive water and eliminate the unnecessary chore of carrying several extra pounds into your home. The Water Department systems will be there for you and will continue to provide high quality potable water throughout the storm event.

ARTHRITIS FOUNDATION SELF-HELP COURSE

Arthritis is a pain - but YOU can make it feel better! Learn by participating in the Arthritis Foundation Self-Help program which will be conducted this winter at the Buzzell Senior Center on School Street. This in-depth, six-week workshop is designed to help participants learn and practice skills needed to better manage their arthritis. Classes cover alternative methods to assist in reducing pain and stress, to cope with fatigue, to proper use of medications and to maximize the benefit from exercising. Developed at Stanford University, the program is taught by certified instructors from the Arthritis Foundation. Scientific studies have shown that this program offers significant benefits to its participants. In one study, participants reduced their pain by 20% and reduced physician visits by 40%. The workshop is highly participatory. Individuals should anticipate having fun and making friends while learning how best to deal with arthritic pain.

The program begins on Wednesday, January 18, 2012 and continues every Wednesday thereafter through February 22, 2012 from 1 p.m. to 3 p.m. There is no charge to participate in this program. A course manual, *The Arthritis Helpbook*, and a relaxation CD will be made available by loan to all participants. This material may be purchased at the discretion of the participant. CHRISTMAS TREE PICK-UP

The Department of Public Works will be collecting Christmas trees at curbside beginning the week of January 3, 2012. Residents should remove all decorations and plastic wrapping from their tree and place it curbside on their regular trash pick-up day. It is anticipated that the collection will take approximately two weeks. Please note that the pick-up may be delayed by weather and other work demands on the DPW.
