From the Manager's Desk



R esidents voted overwhelmingly 197 to 9 in favor of purchasing a 7.86 acre portion of

St. Dorothy's Church property located on Main Street. The property has frontage on both Main Street and Glen Road and is suitable for building. There are no specific plans for the property at this time but given its prominent location this property presents many options for the Town in the future. Over the longer term the Town will need to provide more suitable space for several municipal functions and services including school administration and municipal government administration, elderly services and library services in addition to addressing the need for a fire substation. The St. Dorothy's Church property, which was purchased for \$1,725,000, will be added to the existing inventory of Town property for consideration in the development of an updated facilities plan. The purchase of the church property will not add to the property tax burden because funds were transferred from available funds "free cash." Available funds are funds certified by the state Department of Revenue and serve as a reserve fund to address revenue shortfalls from potential downturns in the economy or to take advantage of unexpected opportunities.

Special Town Meeting participants also agreed to a zoning change to the Highway Industrial Zoning District by permitting personal service shops by right. Personal service shops would include hair salons for example. These zoning districts are located off Ballardvale Street and Fordham Road. A third article submitted by petition to rezone a parcel at 276 Lowell Street from Residential 20 to General Business narrowly failed to obtain the two-thirds majority required for passage.

The firm of Waterfield/Crowe from Winchester, Massachusetts has been selected to perform design services related to the former Yentile Farm property. Following the issuance of a request for proposals (RFP), two design firms were interviewed by the Yentile Farm Development Committee. The committee, chaired by Selectman Judy O'Connell, recommended Waterfield/Crowe for the job. The firm will meet with committee members and participate in public forums to develop multiple conceptual design options for development of the site for recreational use. Based upon information and feedback from committee members and the public, a preferred option will be identified and refined to develop a schematic design to include dimensions of spaces, proposed material types, equipment and structures and estimated costs. Residents are encouraged to check the Town's website, the local newspapers and contact my office for upcoming meeting dates and times.

The Department of Planning & Conservation, under the direction of Carole Hamilton, is finalizing the update to the Town's Open Space and Recreation Plan (OSRP). The purpose of the document is to establish goals for maintenance and expansion of open space and recreational areas and to support conservation where appropriate to preserve the character of Wilmington and foster a place where residents can enjoy the outdoors. Working with the consulting firm Brown/Walker Planners and the Open Space Committee, a draft update was prepared and presented to a public forum held on December 11, 2013. Input from that forum was incorporated into the submission to the Department of Energy and Environmental Affairs. In addition to updating the Town's goals, the OSRP will provide the Town with opportunities to compete for state grant funds to assist with projects like the development of the former Yentile Farm property.

Karen Whitfield, Circulation Assistant at the Wilmington Memorial Library, retired on November 22, 2013 after more than 23 years of dedicated services to the Town. Working in the Children's Department at the library she is one of the bright faces that patrons see when visiting the library. Always eager to assist a child and their parent to find that special book she will be dearly missed. Best wishes for an enjoyable and healthy retirement are extended to Karen.

This time the Wilmington High School girls soccer team captured their first sectional Division 2 North crown by edging out the Concord-Carlisle Patriots 2-1. While the girls lost a close match for the Division 2 State Championship against Notre Dame Academy of Hingham, their performance demonstrated discipline and commitment in pursuit of a goal and selfless teamwork. Congratulations to head coach Sue Hendee and all the young women on the Wilmington Wildcats soccer team.

WILMINGTON POLICE DEPARTMENT INCREASES SOCIAL MEDIA PRESENCE

Chief Michael Begonis is pleased to announce that the Police Department has increased its presence on the Internet by taking a more active role in the use of social media. Police Departments across the nation are seeing the benefits of using social media to alert residents of crime activity in the community, for notification of traffic issues, and crime prevention, as well as identification of suspects. AVOID FROZEN PIPES THIS WINTER



As the winter weather arrives, it is important for residents to take proper precautions to avoid the costly damage that can result from freezing pipes. Residents can prevent this by following a few simple precautions:

Locate your master shut off valve. The master shut-off valve controls all of the water into your home. Residents should know the valve location and how to turn it off as this can save valuable time and prevent water damage in an emergency. Once you locate the main shut off valve, mark it so everyone in your family can find it should an emergency occur.

<u>Keep cold air out</u>. Look for air leaks around electrical wiring, dryer vents and pipes and use caulk or insulation to keep the cold out. With severe cold, even a tiny opening can let in enough cold air to cause a pipe to freeze.

<u>Insulate pipes</u>. Insulate pipes in your home's crawl spaces and attic. Exposed pipes are most susceptible to freezing.

Disconnect garden hoses. Disconnect garden hoses and, if possible, use an indoor valve to shut off and drain water from pipes leading to outside faucets. This reduces the chance of freezing in the short span of pipe just inside the house.

Keep the water running. A trickle of water might be all it takes to keep your pipes from freezing. In extremely cold weather, let water drip overnight, preferably from a faucet on an outside wall. The cost of water is small compared to dealing with the cost and inconvenience of frozen or burst pipes.

The Department of Public Works requests that residents help keep fire hydrants accessible by not plowing or snow blowing onto the hydrant. If able, please clear the area around the hydrant to enable fire crews to quickly connect to a hydrant when it is needed in your neighborhood.

FREE INCOME TAX ASSISTANCE

The Department of Elderly Services will once again provide free income tax assistance through the IRS sponsored Volunteer Income Tax Assistance program. Wilmington residents ages 60 and older may schedule an appointment by calling the Buzzell Senior Center at 978-657-7595. The program begins Wednesday, February 5, 2014 and continues every Wednesday through April 9, 2014 from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. at the Wilmington Town Hall. All tax returns are prepared with computer accuracy and are electronically filed for rapid refunds. Clients should bring the following documents to their appointment:

- * Current year's tax information and last year's tax return
- * W-2 forms
- * Social Security & pension information
- * Tax forms sent by any and all financial institutions
- * Property tax & water bills

Anyone in need of transportation should make arrangements when scheduling their appointment.

WINTER PARKING BAN IN EFFECT



Residents are reminded that the Town of Wilmington enforces an overnight parking ban that is in effect between 1:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m. from December 1 to April 1 each year, and anytime during snow removal operations.

Failure to comply with the regulation will result in the owner receiving a \$50 fine from the Wilmington Police Department and/or the removal of the vehicle at the owner's expense from the roadway during a snow emergency. If a vehicle is impaired and cannot be removed until morning, the owner is required to alert the Wilmington Police Department for assistance.
