The Town uses a notification system called "Everbridge" to issue information to designated neighborhoods impacted by a particular issue or the Town at large. The notification system issues a pre-recorded message for a variety of reasons including crime watch/bulletin alerts, event cancelations or changes, general alerts and public works or utility alerts. Residents can select any or all of the notification groups previously cited after clicking on "Sign-Up."

Town and School departments are developing budget spending plans for the fiscal year that begins July 1, 2018. These efforts require establishing both short-term and long-term plans and projections. The Annual Town Meeting, which takes place on Saturday, May 5, 2018 at 10:30 in the Wilmington High School auditorium, will seek approval of expenditures for municipal services provided during the ensuing 12-month fiscal year in addition to setting money aside in various "savings accounts" referred to as stabilization funds and trust funds.

Businesses, and families for that matter, must not only be attentive to providing financial resources to cover the ongoing immediate expenses, but also to cover larger scale investments. Businesses need to continually reinvest in plant and equipment and possibly a vehicle fleet and maintain an operating reserve to "weather" economic downturns. Homeowners oftentimes will set money aside for continuing education for children, for retirement or for replacement of a roof or furnace for their home and for unanticipated events like job loss or uninsured medical care. Businesses and families who fail to set aside funds for these purposes do so at significant risk. Municipalities, too, must be attentive to immediate expenses and invest in future needs

Stability and sustainability of services continue to be a priority. Education, emergency services, Veterans, library, recreation and elder services and maintenance of roads, parks and Town buildings are essential to meet the expectations of residents. Property taxes have steadily increased, as property values have increased and the costs of government have increased. Some question the need to build available funds, also known as "free cash." The concerns over taxes do not go unheeded. Considerations of ways to save money and maximize the use of tax dollars are on the minds of all managers throughout the year and are an essential part of every annual budget discussion.

The Town will be issuing long term debt in the spring and will undergo a financial review by the rating agency Standard & Poors (S&P). Their assessment of the Town's financial health, both short and long-term, will have a major impact on the interest rates that the Town will pay when bonds are issued. While the Town retains a AA+ bond rating, during S&P's most recent review in 2016 the rating agency expressed some measure of concern about whether the Town could sustain the earmarking of funds into stabilization accounts to address long-term liabilities including funding of employee pensions and Other Post-Employment Benefits (OPEB). The combined value of these liabilities alone total nearly \$200 million. These are challenges faced by municipalities across the state and across the country. A major focus is to continue to take steps that demonstrate to the rating agencies and investment community that purchase our bonds that Wilmington continues to have the financial discipline to address long term obligations as well as fiscal responsibility to ensure sufficient funds are directed toward maintaining day-to-day operations.

The budget presentation will be offered to the Board of Selectmen and Finance Committee on January 29, 2018 at 7:00 p.m. During the month of February, meetings beginning at 7:00 p.m. will be held with the Finance Committee. These meetings are open to the public. Residents will have the opportunity to learn about the programs and services offered by various Town departments and their associated costs. Following the budget process will enable residents to be more fully informed when the budget is presented for adoption at the Annual Town Meeting.

FUEL ASSISTANCE

ICE AND COLD WATER SAFETY

Each year, New England residents are injured from exposure to cold water. Skaters and ice fishermen fall through the ice and boaters capsize. Hikers sometimes have to camp overnight in harsh weather conditions. Unleashed pets run onto ice and people chase them. Learn how to protect yourself and others.

- Always wear a personal floatation device (PFD) when boating.
- Dress properly for cold weather in wool, which insulates better from the effects of hypothermia when dry or wet than man-made materials. Keep your head covered because 50% of body heat is lost through the head.



• The only safe ice is at a skating

rink. Ice on moving water in rivers, streams and brooks is never safe. The thickness of ice on ponds and lakes depends upon water currents or springs, depth and natural objects. Changes in temperature cause ice to expand and contract, which affects its strength. Because of these factors, ice cannot be called *safe*.

WINTER PARKING BAN IN EFFECT

Residents are reminded that the Town of Wilmington enforces an overnight parking ban that is in effect between 1:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m. from December 1 to April 1 each year, and anytime during snow removal operations. Failure to comply with the regulation will result in the owner receiving a \$50 fine from the Wilmington Police Department and/or the removal of the vehicle at the owner's expense from the roadway during a snow emergency. If a vehicle is impaired and cannot be removed until morning, the owner is required to alert the Wilmington Police Department for assistance.

By clearing a hydrant, you are helping the Fire Department's ability to respond quickly to an emergency, possibly at your residence.

AVOID FROZEN PIPES THIS WINTER



As the winter weather arrives, it is important for residents to take proper precautions to avoid the costly damage that can result from freezing pipes. Residents can prevent this by following a few simple precautions:

<u>Locate your master shut off valve</u>. The master shut-off valve controls all of the water into your home. Residents should know the valve location and how to turn it off as this can save valuable time and prevent water damage in an emergency. Once you locate the main shut off valve, mark it so everyone in your family can find it should an emergency occur.

Keep cold air out. Look for air leaks around electrical wiring, dryer vents and pipes and use caulk or insulation to keep the cold out. With severe cold, even a tiny opening can let in enough cold air to cause a pipe to freeze.

<u>Insulate pipes</u>. Insulate pipes in your home's crawl spaces and attic. Exposed pipes are most susceptible to freezing.

<u>Disconnect garden hoses</u>. Disconnect garden hoses and, if possible, use an indoor valve to shut off and drain water from pipes leading to outside faucets. This reduces the chance of freezing in the short span of pipe just inside the house.

Keep the water running. A trickle of water might be all it takes to keep your pipes from freezing. In extremely cold weather, let water drip overnight, preferably from a faucet on an outside wall. The cost of water is small compared to dealing with the cost and inconvenience of frozen or burst pipes.

FREE INCOME TAX ASSISTANCE

The Department of Elderly Services will provide free income tax assistance through IRS VITA Program (Volunteer Income Tax Assistance). Wilmington residents ages 60 and older may schedule an appointment by calling the Buzzell Senior Center at 978-657-7595. The program begins in February at the Buzzell Senior Center. All tax returns are prepared with computer accuracy and are electronically filed for rapid refunds. Clients should bring the following documents to their appointment:

- * Current year's tax information and last year's tax return
- * W-2 forms
- * Social Security & pension information
- * Tax forms sent by any and all financial institutions
- * Property tax & water bills

Anyone in need of transportation should make arrangements when scheduling their appointment.

ANNUAL TOWN ELECTION - TOWN MEETING



Nomination papers are available in the Town Clerk's Office for the Annual Town Election to be held Saturday, April 28, 2018. Interested residents may file nomination papers for the following offices:

Board of Selectmen (1 position), Housing Authority (2 positions) Regional/Vocational School Committee (1 position), School Committee (2 positions) and Town Moderator.

The Annual Town Meeting will be held on Saturday, May 5, 2018 beginning at 10:30 a.m. in the High School Auditorium. Petitioned articles are due in the Town Clerk's office by 4:30 p.m., Friday, February 2, 2018. The last day to register to vote for the Town Election and Annual Town Meeting is Monday, April 9, 2018.

The 2018 Annual Census will be mailed in January. Residents are asked to complete and return the census form as soon as possible. Please call the Town Clerk's Office, 978-658-2030, if you do not receive a census form by the end of January.

CHRISTMAS TREE PICK-UP

The Department of Public Works will be collecting Christmas trees at curbside beginning January 2, 2018. Residents should remove all decorations and plastic wrapping from their tree and place it curbside on their regular trash pickup day. It is anticipated that the collection will take approximately two weeks. Please note that the pick-up may be delayed by weather and other work demands on the DPW.

The Christmas trees collected by the Town will be recycled into mulch. The mulch will be made available to residents in the spring at the Recycling Center and will also be used on Town projects. Residents are advised that Christmas trees **cannot** be disposed of with their regular trash.
