From the Manager's Desk

s this edition of *Town Topics* goes to press,
thanks to the efforts of the July 4th Committee
and several town departments, I am extremely pleased to
report that the Fun on the Fourth tradition will continue in
2014. Events kick off on Wednesday evening, July 2nd on the
Town Common and will continue through Saturday, July 5th
with some events taking place on the Town Common and the
carnival rides being held on the grounds of the Shriners
Auditorium on Fordham Road. A spectacular fireworks display
is set for Saturday evening with a rain date of Sunday, July 6th
at the Shriners Auditorium. Take advantage of this great
chance to stay local and gather with family and friends.

The Yentile Farm Development Committee, led by Chairman of the Board of Selectmen Judith O'Connell and its design consultant Waterfield Design, continue to work through concept design. The vision is for a destination location that will cater to residents of all ages and abilities with opportunities for passive and active recreation. The concept design is currently on display on the town's website, www.wilmingtonma.gov, at the Town Hall, Wilmington Memorial Library and the Buzzell Senior Center. A short 5-question survey accompanies the design and seeks direct feedback on this emerging design. The next Yentile Farm Development Committee meeting is scheduled for July 8, 2014 at 6:00 p.m. in Room 9 at the Town Hall. A third public design workshop is scheduled for July 23, 2014 at 7:00 p.m. at the Wilmington Middle School cafeteria. This session will once again be interactive and seeks to further clarify the expectations for this recreational site.

Feedback from the most recent survey and design workshop will enable the committee to enter the schematic design phase which begins to provide greater detail to the development of spaces on the parcel. With the approval at the May 2014 Annual Town Meeting of \$250,000, the project will be brought through schematic design into design development over the course of the next year. Design development will establish the specific uses and types of material to be used in the recreational area. The construction budget will be refined. During the next year the committee will be preparing a recommendation for naming of the recreational area and developing a funding plan which will likely seek a combination of town appropriation, grants and private donations. Residents are strongly encouraged to provide input on this project and to follow the developments via the town's website and attending meetings.

Road improvements continue to be a priority. Resurfacing was completed on a section of Chestnut Street from Hillside Way to the Woburn line in June. Improvements to drainage and the road surface are targeted for the full length of Cunningham Street. A phased approach was started in 2013 which addressed the Lexington Street section of the road. Phase 2 is included in the town's Capital Improvement Plan and will address the Beeching Avenue and Everett Avenue section. Engineering design work will be completed in 2014. If funding is approved at the May 2015 Annual Town Meeting, the drainage infrastructure and base course paving would be completed in the summer/fall of 2015.

Edward Bradbury retired at the end of May after serving the town for over 40 years, the past 6 years as Fire Chief. Diane Watters retired as Senior Clerk for the DPW after 31 years of service, Joann Roberto retired as Senior Clerk for the Elderly Services Department after 19 years of service and Joanne Benton is retiring July 2 after serving 10 years with the Wilmington School System, the past 7 years as School Superintendent. Each individual has been devoted to their profession and the community and are extended best wishes for health and prosperity in the next phase of their journeys.

With summer upon us, take advantage of all the treasures that Wilmington has to offer including the Farmers Market, Concerts on the Common, Rotary Park, Silver Lake, the Harnden Tavern and Carriage House, Town Forest and the numerous programs offered by the Library, the Senior Center and the Recreation Department. Enjoy and be safe.

SUMMER SAFETY TIPS

The Wilmington Fire Department would like to remind residents that possession and use of all fireworks by private citizens is illegal in Massachusetts. This includes sparklers, party poppers, snappers, firecrackers, cherry bombs and more. Residents are encouraged to enjoy the many professional, supervised fireworks displays.

GASOLINE AND LAWN MOWERS: Gasoline vapors are highly flammable. They stay on your clothing and can ignite if you light a match or cigarette. **Never** fuel a lawn mower while it is hot. Let it cool off first. Keep hands and feet away from a mower while it is running.

BARBECUE SAFELY: Use all barbecue grills away from the house, outdoors. Supervise children when a grill is in use.

GAS GRILLS: LP-gas grills are not permitted inside at all or on balconies above the first floor of any building where people live. Before lighting a grill make sure all connections are secure and tight and open the lid. If the flame goes out, turn off the gas and wait 10 minutes for excess gas to dissipate before relighting.

CHARCOAL GRILLS: Use only charcoal lighter fluid to start charcoal grills. Once coals are lit, never add more lighter fluid to the fire. Flames may travel up the stream of fluid resulting in serious burns.

WHEN YOUR CAR OVERHEATS ALWAYS:

- Turn off your car and wait at least one-half hour before attempting to open the radiator;
- Use a heavy rag or cloth to open the radiator;
- Stand back as far as possible. Keep your face out of the way in case the radiator should rupture.

Opening hot car radiators is one of the leading causes of burns.

NEVER LEAVE A CHILD OR PETS ALONE IN A CAR. In just 10 minutes, a car can heat up 20 degrees Fahrenheit and cracking a window does little to keep the car cool.

FROM THE TOWN CLERK

For submission of an application for a passport, you must have a long form birth certificate. You may obtain the document from either the town/city where the hospital was located or from the town/city where your parents were living at the time of your birth. The document must have a raised seal. The passport office does not accept copies. Please call the Town Clerk's office with questions at 978-658-2030.

PROPERTY TAX EXEMPTIONS

To all Wilmington real estate taxpayers who may be eligible for a property tax exemption in Fiscal Year 2015 (Veterans, Elderly, Widows, Blind, Paraplegics, etc), please be reminded that the Board of Assessors will accept exemption applications beginning in October. If you received an exemption for FY2014 property taxes, an exemption application will be mailed to you by the Assessors Office in October.

By Massachusetts General Law, applications are due for FY 2015 to the Board of Assessors by April 1, 2015 (which is 3 months after the mailing of the actual tax bill on January 1). The Board then has three months to act on the application and may request further information from you regarding your eligibility during that time.

For more information you may:

- review the back of your tax bill which outlines the application filing deadline
- visit the Exemption section of the Assessor's office website to view a brochure that summarizes the exemption qualifications or contact the Assessors office at 978-658-3675

Please remember that filing for an exemption is by ANNUAL application. Your qualifications and status may change year to year as well as the eligibility requirements for certain exemptions. Our office will publish an updated brochure with the new income and asset requirements after July 1, 2014 and they will be available on our website, in our office and at the Senior Center.

WILMINGTON'S 10TH ANNUAL HALF MARATHON & 5K RUN OR WALK

The streets of Wilmington will once again be filled with runners and walkers on Sunday, September 28 as the Wilmington Chamber of Commerce hosts the Town's 10th Annual Half Marathon & 5K Run/Walk. Proceeds from the annual race are reinvested into the community through college scholarships and local donations. Local and regional runners look forward to this race every year because of its flat scenic terrain and low cost. The race is well organized, friendly and conducted in a nonintimidating environment. Race features include: USATF certified courses, professional chip timing, mile splits, water stops, free t-shirts, awards for winners by gender/age/team categories, ribbons for all participants and post race refreshments (hotdogs, ice cream, fruit, etc). Family fun festivities include music provided by a DJ, a Bouncy House, Face Painting and business and community sponsored tables with numerous give-aways.

The half marathon covers 13.1 miles and the 5K is 3.1 miles. Both races begin with a shotgun start at 10:10 am. Registration tables open at 8 am at 10 Waltham Street, in front of WCTV. Pre-registration is strongly recommended to avoid excessive lines during race day registration, to be eligible for a discounted entry fee and to be guaranteed receipt of a commemorative t-shirt. PROTECT AGAINST MOSQUITO and TICKBORNE ILLNESSES

The Board of Health would like to remind residents to take precautions to reduce exposure to mosquitoes and ticks. Avoid outdoor activity during dawn and dusk when there is increased mosquito activity; use mosquito repellents containing an EPA - approved active ingredient such as DEET; wear long clothing to reduce access to skin and remove standing water in your yard.

Wilmington is part of the Central Massachusetts Mosquito Control Project and routine spraying and larvicide treatment is conducted throughout the summer.

In Massachusetts, there are two types of ticks, dog ticks and deer ticks, both of which can make you sick if they bite you. Among the diseases spread by tick bites are Lyme disease and Babesiosis. The best way to protect yourself and your family from these diseases is to follow a few simple preventative measures.

Ticks like damp, shady, brushy, leafy areas. If you have been in an area where ticks might be present, it is important to check yourself, your family and your pets for ticks on a daily basis. Use repellents that contain DEET on your exposed skin, and those that contain permethrin on your clothes. When spending time outside, if weather permits, wear long-sleeved, light colored shirts and long pants tucked into your socks. Around your home, keep the grass cut short and remove piles of leaves and brush. Talk to your veterinarian about the best ways to protect your pets and livestock from ticks.

If you find a tick on yourself, remove it carefully as soon as possible. If you develop a rash or other signs of illness following a tick bite, be sure to contact your health care provider immediately. Remember, the Town only sprays for mosquitoes, there is no program for tick spraying in Massachusetts.

TOWN BEACH AT SILVER LAKE

Town Beach is open each day and staffed with lifeguards through Sunday, August 17. Hours of operation are 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. Wilmington residents, with proof of residency, may use the beach at no charge.

NOTICE

At its meeting of May 12, 2014 and by unanimous vote, the Board of Selectmen adopted the following regulations:

Prohibit dogs on Town beaches and Town property adjacent to Silver Lake, specifically 49 Grove Avenue, 47 Grove Avenue, Grove Avenue/Baby Beach, 79 Main Street, 81 Main Street and 5 Burnap Street from May 1 to October 1. Violation is punishable by a \$50 fine.

Prohibit the creation of fire pits, open flame, use of grills or other types of cooking devices to prepare food on Town beaches and Town property adjacent to Silver Lake, specifically 49 Grove Avenue, 47 Grove Avenue, Grove Avenue/Baby Beach, 79 Main Street, 81 Main Street and 5 Burnap Street, subject to issuance of a permit to be granted by the Recreation Commission. Violation is punishable by a \$50 fine.

Prohibit parking on Grove Avenue from the southwest corner of 3 Grove Avenue on the northerly side to Burnap Street and on the southerly side from Main Street to Burnap Street encompassing property formerly known as the DAV property and on Burnap Street from Grove Avenue to Pond Street and on Pond Street in the direction to the southwest corner of 1 Pond Street. Violation is punishable by a \$15 fine.

NATIONAL NIGHT OUT

The introduction of National Night Out, "America's Night Out Against Crime", in 1984 began an effort to promote involvement in crime prevention activities, police-community partnerships and neighborhood camaraderie. WATER CONSERVATION

With the hot summer days arriving, residents are reminded that the Town of Wilmington has active water use restrictions. There is no outdoor watering allowed between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. In the case of sprinkler systems, both above-ground and installed underground systems may only be used once per week, subject to the hours above. Other outside water use is restricted to hand held hoses only. Per the Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection, the Town will be required to ban sprinklers entirely if this policy is not followed. Failure to follow the water use restriction may result in a minimum \$50.00 per day fine. Thank you for your continued cooperation.

SUMMER YARDWASTE PROGRAM

The Town's yardwaste recycling facility located on Old Main Street off of Main Street at the Woburn line, will open on six different dates this summer. Wilmington residents only may use the center to drop off leaves and brush. In order to use the facility, residents must purchase a \$15 punch card at the Treasurer/Collector's Office at Town Hall. The card has no expiration date and is good for 5 visits to the facility. Residents will be asked to show the punch card and an ID at the entrance to the facility. No grass clippings may be disposed at the recycling center due to the odors they create. NO CONTRACTORS or COMMERCIAL VEHICLES are allowed.
