## From the Manager's Desk

own departments have begun work authorized by the adoption of the fiscal year 2018 budget.

Replacement of the 22,100 square foot roof at the Boutwell Early Childhood Center and replacement of 24,647 square feet of roof at the North Intermediate School will be completed this summer. Both schools will have completely new roofing systems when school opens on August 29th. Additionally, replacement of the 26 year old chair lift at the Shawsheen School will be completed before school resumes. This work will ensure that students, staff and visitors with mobility challenges will have access to the school. Replacement of the 17 year old building management system in the Middle School will provide for reliable control of the HVAC system.

Continuing to upgrade water infrastructure is critical to meeting the demands for potable water. During this construction season work will begin on the replacement of 1500 linear feet of 10" water main with a 12" water main along Middlesex Avenue from the Congregational Church to Federal Street and 3,600 linear feet of 6" water main with 12" water main from Route 125 across the Interstate 93 overpass to Salem Street. Work is expected to be substantially completed by late fall of 2017 with final paving completed in 2018.

The Public Works Department has targeted a number of road resurfacing projects throughout town. While this work is weather dependent, roads on the docket include: a portion of Andover Street from the split with Woburn Street south easterly; Arlene Avenue and other streets in that neighborhood; Brattle Street; Burnap Street and Cunningham Street from Allston Street to Salem Street. Solar powered pedestrian beacons will be placed at the crosswalks on the Church Street and Middlesex Avenue sides of the Town Common to improve safety.

Other work to be completed this summer includes reconstruction of the drop-off area and replacement of sidewalks at the North Intermediate School and resurfacing of the Woburn Street tennis courts and striping of courts for pickleball.

Based upon comments offered by residents at the June 12, 2017 Board of Selectmen's meeting, efforts are underway to work with the Massachusetts Department of Transportation (MassDOT) to replace the existing Butters Row Bridge with a two lane bridge with a sidewalk. While this bridge is not in the upper tier of bridges in the district scheduled for replacement and is likely to take several years to obtain design and construction, town representatives will be working closely with MassDOT and the legislative delegation in pursuit of moving this bridge project up in queue on the priority list. Clearly, safety is a major concern with the existing one lane bridge. The volume of traffic on Butters Row and Chestnut Street, particularly during commuter hours, is a major concern of residents and town officials alike. Assessing alternatives to mitigate some of the traffic will remain a town focus, while the Police Department will continue to conduct speed enforcement. There is no single approach that will dramatically reduce traffic. In this day and age with ability of motorists to use cell phone apps like Waze they are much more easily able to find the "path of least resistance." The fact that Wilmington has so many "connector" streets that are used to access Interstate 93 or Interstate 95 makes deployment of resources to address the traffic throughout town particularly difficult.

I wish to express my gratitude for the contributions of two long term employees who recently retired. Robert Burke, Elderly Services Van Driver, retired after 19 years of serving Wilmington's elders. Winifred McGowan, Assistant Director of Planning and Conservation, for the past twelve years has provided advice and guidance to the Conservation Commission and worked with residents and developers as they navigate the permitting process associated with the Wetlands Protection Act.

We are able to transport elders to destinations including, but not limited to, their medical appointments, shopping and to/from the Senior Center. KAYAKING IS BACK - The Wilmington Department of Elderly Services is happy to bring back Kayak Classes. This four part course, provided by the LL Bean Outdoor Discovery Program, covers all the basic skills and safety techniques essential to recreational kayaking. You will learn the essentials of recreational kayaking, including launching techniques, paddling equipment, kayaking safety, reading weather conditions, and more. You will learn about paddling terminology and basic paddling strokes. Instructors will lead you step by step through each stroke, helping you hone and refine your abilities throughout the course. We will also have technique building for the more experienced.

Each day, a short, guided tour with the group will allow you to practice your skills while getting a close-up view of the wildlife that inhabit these waters. Our skilled guides will share their extensive knowledge of the sport of kayaking, the local waters and the history of the surrounding area. All necessary equipment is provided.

Classes will be held at Lake Quannapowitt in Wakefield, MA on Thursdays, August 24, 31, September 7 and 14. Sign-up will be the week of July 31, 2017 – Cost is \$50.00 for 4 weeks of fun.

#### **CAMPUS FIRE SAFETY**



Going to college can be an exciting time for students and their parents, but it also brings an increased level of student responsibility while at

school. According to the U.S. Fire Administration (USFA), there were 85 fatal fires in dormitories, Greek housing and off-campus housing from January 2000 to May 2015. These fires resulted in 118 fatalities.

Whether on- or off- campus, it's important for students and parents to understand fire risks and life-saving preventive actions. There are several specific causes for fires in college housing including cooking, candles, smoking and overloaded power strips.

Be fire safe! The USFA encourages students to follow these tips, including:

Keep your cooking area clean and free of anything that can burn;

Use flameless candles;

Check for cigarette butts, especially under cushions, after a party;

Use surge protectors or power strips that have internal overload protection; and

Have a fire escape plan with two ways out of every room if you live off-campus.

Parents can also help promote off-campus fire safety through the "See it Before You Sign It" campaign from the National Fire Protection Association. This campaign encourages parents to help their loved ones choose secure, fire safe housing in apartments or homes that are off-campus.

## STORMWATER ALERT! ILLICIT DISCHARGES ARE PROHIBITED!

July 1, 2017 marks the beginning of Wilmington's new permit term with EPA's National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) program which has been established to help maintain clean stormwater in urbanized communities in Massachusetts. As this is an important issue for Wilmington

and all Ipswich River
Watershed communities, it
is the town's duty to
remind residents,
commercial property
owners, industries and
commercial developers that
Wilmington has its own
Illicit Discharge By-law.



An *illicit discharge* is defined as any release into the Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System (MS4, or simply "storm drainage system") of contaminated water, or any non-stormwater discharge, that contributes pollutants to receiving waters. The Town of Wilmington is committed to enforcing the Illicit Discharge By-law and, as such, fines have already been assessed for violations. It's important to stay educated on what is and is not considered illegal under the Illicit Discharge By-law.

## Lawn Care - Mass Fertilizer Regulations

Massachusetts recently approved new fertilizer regulations (333 CMR 31) which affect ANYONE applying fertilizer, even homeowners. DPW Operations Manager Jamie Magaldi will summarize the relatively new regulations that all contractors, landscape professionals, fertilizer retailers, property caretakers and homeowners should be aware of. Jamie will discuss how to replace widely accepted nutrient overloading practices with a more tailored, soils based approach.

## WILMINGTON'S $13^{TH}$ ANNUAL HALF MARATHON & 5K RUN OR WALK

The streets of Wilmington will once again be filled with runners and walkers on Sunday, September 17 as the Wilmington/ Tewksbury Chamber of Commerce hosts the Town's 13th Annual Half Marathon & 5K Run/Walk. A portion of the proceeds from the annual race are reinvested into the community through college scholarships and local donations. Local and regional runners look forward to this race every year because of its flat scenic terrain and low cost. The race is well organized, friendly and conducted in a non-intimidating environment. Race features include: USATF certified courses, professional chip timing, mile markers, water stops, free tshirts, awards for winners by gender/age/team categories, medals for all half marathon participants, ribbons for all 5K participants and post race refreshments. Family fun festivities include music, face painting and business and community sponsored tables with raffles and give-aways.

#### WATER CONSERVATION

With the hot summer days arriving, residents are reminded that the Town of Wilmington has active water use restrictions. There is no outdoor watering allowed between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. In the case of sprinkler systems, both above-ground and installed underground systems may only be used once per week, subject to the hours above. Other outside water use is restricted to hand held hoses only. Per the Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection, the Town will be required to ban sprinklers entirely if this policy is not followed. Failure to follow the water use restriction may result in a minimum \$50.00 per day fine. Thank you for your continued cooperation.

## SUMMER YARDWASTE PROGRAM

The Town's yardwaste recycling facility located on Old Main Street off of Main Street at the Woburn line, will open on six different dates this summer. Wilmington residents only may use the center to drop off leaves and brush. In order to use the facility, residents must purchase a \$15 punch card at the Treasurer/Collector's Office at Town Hall. The card has no expiration date and is good for 5 visits to the facility. Residents will be asked to show the punch card and an ID at the entrance to the facility. No grass clippings may be disposed at the recycling center due to the odors they create. Stumps will not be accepted. NO CONTRACTORS or COMMERCIAL VEHICLES are allowed.
