From the Manager's Desk



ilmington is in the midst of an extraordinary period. The recent Tax Increment Finance (TIF) agreement with Analog Devices, Inc. creates the necessary catalyst for this global technology leader to invest \$142.9 million in the construction of 441,000 square feet of space as part of their effort to make Wilmington their global headquarters. Construction is ongoing to upgrade the FedEx facility on Ballardvale Street and the DSM Resin headquarters on Main Street. Monogram Foods on Ballardvale Street recently expanded into another building with a \$4 million fit-up. This is just some of the activity ongoing in the commercial and industrial sectors in town.

Residential single family housing construction remains strong. The Murray Hill development, construction on MacDonald Road, in the Green Meadow Drive subdivision and the 27 single family and duplex units of over age 55 housing in the Spruce Farm development are all underway. This ongoing level of development is a significant indicator of the local economy.

However, vacancies persist along the Route 38 commercial corridor. The Town will be engaging the services of the Economic and Public Policy Research group at the UMass Donahue Institute to perform a market study of the corridor extending from Richmond Street to Clark Street. The goals of this study are to identify factors such as what may be contributing to turnover in commercial enterprises, the inability to fill these vacant spaces in a timely manner and to develop a profile of shoppers who frequent this section of Route 38.

Interviews will be conducted with local officials, business leaders and real estate professionals to understand the market conditions that may influence decisions about business development and longevity.

Work will begin in early July and is expected to be completed by October. This effort is only a first step in understanding the Route 38 market and having a much broader discussion about the types of service and retail establishments that residents are seeking in this corridor. The study will provide a baseline for a discussion on how to balance potential increase in business activity with the corresponding increase in traffic. Residents are strongly encouraged to participate in this discussion.

The Town completed financial rating review in May with Standard & Poors Global (S&P) and once again has retained its AA+ standing. The rating seeks to inform potential investors in the Town's newly issued debt about the "financial health" of the Town and its ability to pay its obligations. The rating gave the Town high marks for its financial policies and practices, its conservative budgeting, its ongoing use of a five-year capital improvement budget and its policies with respect to maintaining financial reserves. Concerns remain about the Town's Other Post-Employment Benefits (OPEB) and pension liabilities. S&P did acknowledge the Town's sustained efforts to earmark funds into stabilization accounts to address each of these liabilities in addition to making advance payments against its pension liability. The Town will continue to make decisions designed to sustain and improve the financial strength of the community.

During the past couple of months, two highly regarded longtime members of the Fire Department announced their retirement. With a combined 71 years of service to the community and experience on the Wilmington Fire Department, Deputy Fire Chief Gary Donovan and Acting Lieutenant Robert Woods decided to call it a career. Their institutional knowledge of fire and emergency medical response on the main roads and back roads of Wilmington will be missed. We wish both gentlemen long and prosperous retirements.

As another academic year draws to a close I extend my sincere "thank you" to the teachers, staff and administration of the Wilmington School Department for continuing to foster an environment of inquisitiveness and learning and wish the graduating class of 2018 all the best as you leave the safe harbors of Wilmington for the ocean of opportunity that awaits. And finally, I wish to extend a warm welcome to Dr. Glenn Brand who will assume the critical role of Superintendent of Schools beginning July 1st. I fully expect the longstanding cooperative relationship with the School Department will continue.

VIETNAM MOVING WALL

The Veterans' Services Department has announced that the Town of Wilmington will host the Vietnam Moving Wall. This special honor comes to Wilmington on July 26, 2018 and was previously here in September 2008.

The Moving Wall is the half size replica of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial located in Washington, DC. For the past 30 years the Vietnam Moving Wall has been on display in hundreds of cities and towns across America.



The local Moving Wall Committee, chaired by Director of Veterans' Services Louis Cimaglia, has planned appropriate ceremonies for each night that The Wall will be on display. Opening ceremonies will be held on July 26 beginning at 7:00 p.m. Visitors are invited to

experience this powerful display of American history. The Vietnam Moving Wall contains the names of four Wilmington young men who gave the ultimate sacrifice for the country.

The RIDE

The RIDE is the MBTA's door-to-door, shared-ride paratransit service. The RIDE is operated by the MBTA in compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). If you have a disability that prevents you from using the MBTA bus, subway or trolley all or some of the time, The RIDE may be able to assist with your public transportation needs.

The RIDE is available in 58 cities and towns (including Wilmington) in the greater Boston area, with similar operating hours to the MBTA -generally from 5 a.m. to 1 a.m. daily. To access The RIDE, you must apply and be approved by The RIDE Eligibility Center (TREC). Your eligibility for The RIDE does not depend on the nature of your disability, but rather whether or not you can use public transit. If you have had a medical emergency, your licensed healthcare provider can request 30 days of The RIDE for you that starts immediately. To continue to use The RIDE after the first 30 days, you need to apply.

To apply for The RIDE, you need to have an in-person interview at The RIDE Eligibility Center: 1000 Massachusetts Avenue, 2nd Floor, Boston, MA 02118. Call 617-337-2727 to set up an

appointment. All applicants (and 1 guest) can take The RIDE for free to their interview. Ask about arranging transportation when you call.

BOARD OF HEALTH ADVICE REGARDING MOSQUITOES AND TICKS

Now that mosquito and tick season is upon us, the Board of Health would like to remind residents to take precautions to reduce their risk of exposure to mosquitoes and ticks.

MOSQUITOES

Try to avoid outdoor activity during times of day with increased mosquito activity, which is dawn and dusk. Use mosquito repellents containing an EPA-approved active ingredient such as DEET.

Residents should wear long sleeved clothing to reduce mosquito access to skin and remove any standing water in your yard, including children's toys, birdbaths, pots and planters.

Wilmington is part of the Central Massachusetts Mosquito Control Project and routine spraying and larvicide treatment is conducted throughout the summer.

TICKS

Ticks are prevalent in Wilmington. Ticks like damp, shady, brushy, leafy areas. If you have been in an area where ticks might be present, it is important to check yourself, your family and your pets for ticks every day. Use repellents that contain DEET on your exposed skin and those that contain permethrin on your clothes. When spending time outside, if weather permits, wear long-sleeved, light colored shirts and long pants tucked into your socks.

Keep the grass cut short and remove piles of leaves and brush. Talk to your veterinarian about the best ways to protect your pets and livestock from ticks.

If you find a tick on yourself, remove it carefully as soon as possible. If you develop a rash or other signs of illness following a tick bite, be sure to contact your health care provider immediately. If you are looking into preventative tick control, check out tick tubes, which may be found online. They work great ridding areas of deer ticks only. Remember deer ticks are the ones that transmit Lyme Disease. If you have been bitten by a tick, log on to the Board of Health website for links to get the ticks tested.

WILMINGTON'S 14TH ANNUAL HALF MARATHON & 5K RUN OR WALK

The streets of Wilmington will once again be filled with runners and walkers on Sunday, September 23 as the Wilmington/ Tewksbury Chamber of Commerce hosts the Town's 14th Annual Half Marathon & 5K Run/Walk. A portion of the proceeds from the annual race are reinvested into the community through college scholarships and local donations. Local and regional runners look forward to this race every year because of its flat scenic terrain and low cost. The race is well organized, friendly and conducted in a non-intimidating environment. Race features include: USATF certified courses, professional chip timing, mile markers, water stops, free drawstring cinch sack to first 500 registrants, awards for winners by gender/age/team categories, medals for all half marathon participants, ribbons for all 5K participants and post race refreshments. Family fun festivities include music, face painting and business and community sponsored tables with raffles and give-aways.

The half marathon covers 13.1 miles and the 5K is 3.1 miles. Both races begin with a shotgun start at 10 am. Registration tables open at 8 am at 10 Waltham Street, in front of WCTV. Pre-registration is strongly recommended to avoid excessive lines during race day registration, to be eligible for a discounted entry fee and to be guaranteed receipt of a drawstring cinch sack. WATER CONSERVATION

With the hot summer days arriving, residents are reminded that the Town of Wilmington has active water use restrictions. **There is no outdoor watering allowed between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m.** In the case of sprinkler systems, both above-ground and installed underground systems may only be used once per week, subject to the hours above. Other outside water use is restricted to hand held hoses only. Per the Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection, the Town will be required to ban sprinklers entirely if this policy is not followed. Failure to follow the water use restriction may result in a minimum \$50.00 per day fine. Thank you for your continued cooperation.

SUMMER YARDWASTE PROGRAM

The Town's yardwaste recycling facility located on Old Main Street off of Main Street at the Woburn line, will open on six different dates this summer. Wilmington residents <u>only</u> may use the center to drop off leaves and brush. In order to use the facility, residents must purchase a \$15 punch card at the Treasurer/Collector's Office at Town Hall. The card has no expiration date and is good for 5 visits to the facility. Residents will be asked to show the punch card and an ID at the entrance to the facility. No grass clippings may be disposed at the recycling center due to the odors they create. Stumps will not be accepted. NO CONTRACTORS or COMMERCIAL VEHICLES are allowed.
