From the Manager's Desk

As has been widely publicized, communities across the state and across the country are seeing upward pressures on recycling costs due to a significant reduction in the market for recyclable material. Effective January 1, 2018, China invoked the "National Sword" policy which dramatically reduced the amount of recyclables including plastics and paper that China would import from other countries. Part of their rationale for this restriction are claims that the recyclable material being received had a higher than acceptable level of contamination or non-recyclable content.

Since China has been such a significant importer of recyclable material, this policy change has posed major challenges and costs for moving recyclable material. Some material recovery facilities (MRFs) have been forced to stockpile material in the hopes that the demand for recyclables will rebound. Some markets still exist for recyclables in places like Vietnam, Indonesia and India, however, these countries cannot offset the capacity shortfall created when China left the market.

The challenges that the Town has faced with increased costs for processing recyclables at the MRF in Charlestown has raised the question amongst some: Why continue to place paper, plastics and metals into recycling barrels?

The short answer is that it's the law. The Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection requires that municipalities establish mandatory recycling programs. Additionally, Chapter 5, Section 2A of the *Town of Wilmington Inhabitant By-laws, Revised* states that "residents of every household are required to separate recyclable material from the solid waste stream and to deposit the material for collection as prescribed by rules and regulations as may be established by the Board of Selectmen."

There are clearly multiple benefits to keeping material out of the trash waste stream. Recycling creates the opportunity to reconstitute the materials in a new form that can be used for another purpose and avoids incinerating or burying the material. Recycling reduces the demand for landfill space. Generally speaking, recycling is more environmentally friendly than the alternative.

The Town has a contract for disposal of trash/refuse at the Wheelabrator North Andover waste-to-energy facility located off Interstate 495. Inclusion of items deemed to be recyclable in the refuse stream are not permissible. Each refuse vehicle entering the facility is subject to inspection. Depending upon the amount of recyclable material found mixed in with the trash, the community from which the truck originated may receive a letter placing the community on notice about the infraction. A greater amount of recyclable material mixed in with trash, or a high frequency of such episodes, could result in the load of material being rejected. Such a circumstance would increase the Town's refuse disposal costs as it would become necessary to identify another disposal facility to accept the material for disposal.

Finding markets for recyclables is a national, and international, challenge. However, these market conditions should not lead us to abandon longstanding efforts to reduce what we consume, reuse what cannot be consumed and recycle what cannot be

reused. The Town of Wilmington has come a long way over the past thirty years when the first voluntary recycling dropoff program was established at the current yard waste center in south Wilmington.

SENIOR CITIZEN WORK PROGRAM

The Senior Citizen Work Program offers Wilmington residents the opportunity to work off a portion of their property tax by working part-time for the Town. This year's program will enable the Town to fill a minimum of 20 positions in various school and municipal departments. Participants earn \$11/hour for up to 80 hours of "volunteer" service. Since the program's beginning in 1995, approximately 430 positions have been filled.

The purpose of the program is to assist seniors in reducing their property tax burden. Participants MUST be Wilmington residents occupying a house for which property taxes are paid (or spouse of homeowner), have limited financial resources and be 60 years of age or older as of January 1, 2019. Applications are available in the Town Manager's Office and at the Buzzell Senior Center. Application Deadline: October 26, 2018. As in past years, priority will be given to qualified applicants not previously selected for the program. All seniors, regardless of past participation however, are encouraged to apply. Job listings and program information are on the application.

SNOWPLOW CONTRACTORS FOR DPW

FROM THE FIRE DEPARTMENT

November 4th is the date to set clocks back one hour. The Fire Department recommends replacing the batteries in all Carbon Monoxide and Smoke Detectors including plug-in and hard-wired types, which usually have battery back up in case of power loss. Massachusetts Law requires replacement of smoke detectors after 10 years.

PROTECT YOUR PIPES

Change your clock,

As the colder weather approaches, residents are encouraged to review items around their home that need to be protected from freezing, especially water pipes and meters. Failure to properly prepare for the winter months can lead to freeze-ups, which leave residents without water. Since freeze-ups typically occur in the basement, it is important to eliminate cold drafts by securely closing windows and doors along with filling gaps with expandable foam insulation. Wrapping vulnerable pipes with pipe insulation is another step that helps to prevent freeze-ups. These maintenance items are inexpensive and may be purchased at any home improvement store. A few minutes of prevention this fall can save you from real troubles when the snow flies. Please take a moment to check these items in addition to winterizing your sill cocks, garden hoses and sprinkler systems before the holiday season.

AVOIDING THE FLU

Anyone can get the flu and, most importantly, anyone can give the flu to somebody else. Children can give it to their grandparents; babysitters can give it to newborns; workers can give it to co-workers who may have unknown health problems; and family members can give it to people in their households who may be at risk for serious complications of flu. A mild case of flu for one person may be deadly to another person.

To Prevent The Flu This Year

- · Cover coughs and sneezes.
- Wash hands for 20 seconds with soap and water before eating and after going to the bathroom.
- Stay away from people who have a fever and sore throat.
- · Stay home if sick.
- · Get a flu shot.

FALL YARDWASTE PROGRAM

The end of the year curbside pick-up of leaves and grass clippings will begin on November 5 and extend for five weeks through December 8. Residents should place their yardwaste in biodegradable paper bags or uncovered barrels at curbside on their regular trash collection day. Yardwaste in plastic bags will not be accepted.

Residents may also use the recycling center off Old Main Street near the Woburn line for leaves and brush drop-off. The center will open for 9 weeks on Wednesdays and Saturdays from October 10 through and including December 8. Hours of operation are Wednesdays, 8 a.m. - 2 p.m. and Saturdays, 9 a.m. - 4 p.m.

In order to use the yardwaste recycling facility, residents must purchase a \$15 punch card which is good for five visits to the center. The card may be purchased at the Treasurer/

Collector's Office, Room 1, Town Hall. Wilmington residents only are allowed to use the facility for leaves and brush drop-off. NO GRASS CLIPPINGS. The punch card and an ID must be presented at the entrance. No contractors or commercial vehicles are allowed to use the facility.

TRASH AND RECYCLING INFORMATION

Residents are reminded to have their Trash and Recycling placed curbside by **6:30 a.m.** on their collection day. Once trash and recycling have been collected, residents should pull their barrels off of the street.

Please **DO NOT** include plastic bags in the recycling barrel. All soft plastics such as grocery bags, dry cleaning wraps, bread and produce bags, food storage bags and case wraps (plastic surrounding a case of water, a package of diapers or paper towels) must be kept out of your recycle container. Plastic grocery bags can be returned to the supermarket for recycling and other soft plastics may be disposed of in your trash.

Every residence is allowed to dispose of one bulky item each week. Bulky items include, but are not limited to, sofas, chairs, bureaus, bicycles, mattress and box spring, gas grill (no propane) and tables. To arrange for pick up of a bulky item, call Russell Disposal by 11 a.m. on Thursday. Bulky items are picked up on Fridays.

If you move from your home, the trash and recycle barrels $\underline{\text{must}}$ remain with the house.
